Massachusetts Republican State Convention.

BUTLER DEFEATED.

Worcester, Mass., Sept. 28.—The result of the vote on the nomination for Governor in the Republican Convention, was: for Washburn, 643; for Butler, 464.

Butler declares that he accepts the action of the Convention as final.

Resolutions endorsing Grant were adopted. The resolutions say that "Woman's suffrage requires respectful and careful consideration."

Renowned Imperial Abdication.

Vienna, Austria, September 28.—It is rumored that Francis Joseph, the Emperor of Austria, is about to abdicate. The cause assigned is that he is his dependent on his ministers to meet the constitutional crisis, which threatens the dissolution of the Empire.

New York Republican State Convention.

Syracuse, N. Y., September 28.—In the Republican convention last night, one of the New York city delegations withdrew, angry at being allowed only half a vote; after which the convention adjourned to 9 o'clock this morning.

The Greeley delegation had a meeting early this morning, and invited the dissatisfied delegations. The room being too small, they adjourned to the City Hall, where better feelings were expressed, but without action they adjourned to 11 o'clock.

[NOTE.—It seems that the three delegations from New York stand thus: Fenonites excluded; Conklingites and Greeleyites admitted, with half a vote each; upon which the Greeleyites withdrew and the pending question is upon conferring the full vote upon the Conklingites.]

The committee on permanent organization reported, recommending A. D. White for president, which was adopted.

White returned thanks for the honor conferred upon him.

C. H. Hiltner was then nominated for Secretary of the State, by acclamation; Thos. C. Barlow, for Attorney-General, and Wm. B. Taylor, for State Engineer.

Foreign Miscellany.

Heavy gales have recently prevailed off the English coast.

A colliery exploded in Yorkshire, England, killing several persons.

Napoleon has the rheumatism at Torquay.

The Brazilian Chambers have adjourned without concurrent action upon the bill emancipating slaves.

The ship "Hesperus" has been wrecked off the mouth of the river Weser, and all hands lost.

The Italian ambassador Chevalier Nigra, has been recalled from France.

King Amadeus, of Spain, opens the Cortes on Monday next.

LAST NIGHTS DISPATCHES.

New York Republican Convention.

Syracuse, N. Y., Sept. 27.—Pending a temporary organization of the Convention there was considerable tumult. The police were called upon the platform to preserve order.

The vote for temporary chairman resulted—White, 188; Scribner, 159.

By consent, the contesting delegations did not vote.

The Committee on Contested Seats consists of one from each district, except the first.

White, in addressing the Convention, said he would do all he could to promote harmony in the party.

In the course of his remarks he mentioned Grant's name, which was received with applause. He said that while Grant was called a butcher, he had saved from butchery four-fold the number which fell under his military career.

B. D. Stillman is chairman of the committee on resolutions.

The committee on resolutions was appointed by A. D. White, the temporary chairman, who was one of the San Domingo commissioners.

At 7 P. M. the committee on credentials reported, and a lengthy discussion ensued. The regular delegation from Kings county was admitted.

The Bliss delegation of Fenton men was excluded. Roscoe Conkling himself, with the Onondaga county delegates, were admitted.

The committee reported in favor of admitting both delegations from New York city, and that each be charged to cast half a vote. The minority report favored the admission of the Greeley delegates, which was received with nine cheers. Cheers followed for Grant, Conkling, and Fenton.

At 9:30 P. M. the disorder still continued. Massachusetts Republican Convention.

Worcester, Mass., September 27.—Butler, Dawes and others had a prolonged discussion on a question at issue, which was deemed somewhat of a test of strength, and the question was decided against Butler.

George F. Hoar has been elected President, together with fifty vice presidents.

Hoar lauded the general and State administrations, and strongly favored woman's suffrage.

Charbonnet was appointed chairman of the committee on resolutions.

It is conceded on all sides that Butler's tactics are thus far successful. The nomination is improbable to-day.

Clafin and Dr. Loring have withdrawn from the candidature.

10 P. M.—Butler has been defeated on a test vote, which amounted to 460 to 490.

The vote was announced amid tremendous excitement, and was received with long-continued cheering. Such a scene was never before witnessed in a State convention.

The result is considered as effectually disposing of Butler.

11 P. M.—Upon the announcement of the vote, Butler declared that over one hundred delegates were absent from the lack of tickets of admission to the hall, and moved that the chairman of the convention be instructed to investigate the matter.

The National Commercial Convention.

Baltimore, September 27.—Among the resolutions offered to-day was a series, by Mr. Rhodes, of Ohio, in regard to making Helena, Ark., a port of entry; the improvement of St. John (Florida) river; the seizure of goods by irresponsible revenue officers; the abolition of the special whiskey taxes; and making the whiskey tax payable at the distilleries; the establishment of an export tax on whiskey; a uniform tax on raw tobacco; the abolition

of discriminations against insurance companies asking appropriations for the Mississippi levees, Charleston harbor, Ohio river, and other waters; the enactment by all the States of a general railroad law acknowledging the right of the United States to charter railroads passing through the several States.

The resolutions were all referred to the appropriate committees, and after the appointment of special committees, the convention adjourned.

The Ku-Klux Trial at Raleigh.

Raleigh, N. C., Sept. 27.—In the United States Circuit Court to-day the case of Amos Owen and others was continued. The morning session was consumed in the discussion of points of law. Counsel are now arguing the case.

The following prisoners, having been acquitted of the charges of ku-kluxing, were discharged: Wm. Tamer, Catherine Neal, F. A. Shotwell, Joe Dellinger, John Evans, David Henry, J. E. Saunders, and R. Hecks.

Fatal Fire on the Coast of Lake Michigan.

Milwaukee, Wisconsin, September 27.—A fire is raging along the coast of Lake Michigan, between Manitowish and Amnec. The farmers are burning their household goods to save them. All communication is cut off, and unless it rains, the loss of property and life will be fearful. The wells are all dried up.

A person who escaped through the fire on horseback was badly singed. He reports that he counted twenty houses and barns in ashes.

Fatal Encounter, &c.

Knoxville, Tenn., Sept. 27.—Colonel D. M. Nelson, son of Judge T. A. B. Nelson, of the Supreme court, shot and killed General G. H. Langley, of Alabama, this evening in personal encounter.

After a whole day's discussion by able counsel on both sides in the case of the Alabama and Chattanooga railroad, Judge Trigg postponed the cause until the 12th proximo.
