House bill to amend the charter of the town of Ashland.

The Committee on Courts of Justice reported to the House the law so as to make the fees of the Commonwealth's Attorney, in criminal cases not dependent on conviction. Concurred in.

JAMES RIVER BRIDGE.

Senate bill to amend the charter of the James River bridge company, came up as unfinished business.

Messrs. Gilman, Lovensien and Brown spoke against Mr. Daniel's amendment, (which renders the bill nugatory.) Mr. Daniel spoke in favor of his amendment.

Mr. Daniel's amendment was lost by a vote of 81 to 25.

The question recurring on the final passage of the bill, it was carried by a large majority.

THE LAND SCRIP FUND.

Mr. Kitchel favored an appropriation of this fund to Randolph Macon College, Messrs. Hill and Head spoke in favor of the University and Virginia Military Institute.

TERMS OF CIRCUIT COURTS.

Senate bill, to authorize the Circuit courts of this State to change their terms, being the unfinished business of yesterday, was taken up and the bill was ordered to be engrossed and read the third time.

THE SEALS OF THE COMMONWEALTH.

Senate bill, to fix the seals of the Commonwealth, was taken up. Mr. Patterson offered a substitute. The bill and substitute were then laid on the table.

PUNISHMENT BY STRIPES.

The report of the Committee recommending the rejection of Senate bill to prevent punishment by stripes, was taken up.

The recommendation of the committee was supported by Messrs. Herndon, Boykin, Patterson, Wayne, Humbley and Kirkpatrick, and opposed by Messrs. Eidenmore, Stevens, Norton, Graham and Green.

A motion to lay the bill on the table was lost.

The bill was then put on its passage and rejected by the following vote:

ANOTHER LOCK DECISION.

Commissioner Douglas, under authority conferred by the act of Congress of July 30, 1868, has modified the special circular issued by ex-Commissioner Pleasanton, of February 10, 1871. It required the American seal-locks and seals to be exclusively used at distilleries and internal revenue bonded warehouses. The modification requires the use of the American seal-locks only at such portions of distillery premises by which access can be had to the spirit during its passage from the beer-still to the receiving cisterns, and also to the doors of the cistern-room and the distillery warehouse. For other portions of the premises any lock heretofore prescribed and in good condition may be used.

FOREIGN SUMMARY.

The laborers on the Panama railroad have struck.

An imperial decree subjects all male citizens of Russia to military duty.

Several wealthy Cubans are opening extensive plantations on the Isthmus.

A steamer from Trinidad has landed 4,500 muskets and 1,000,000 cartridges for the Lagunera revolutionists.

The Internationals throughout Spain are petitioning the government for the revocation of the stringent regulations against them.

It is reported that the German government refuses to join in the movement of the European powers for the suppression of the International Society.

President Thiers receives gratifying evidence of public confidence from all quarters, and it is understood that he has decided to abstain hereafter from participating in the debates of the Assembly, except on important occasions.

The Cuban leaders are said to be beginning to despair of recognition by the United States as belligerents. They will endeavor to influence Congress against Spanish rule by showing the landing in Cuba of 25,000 coolies and several cargoes of slaves.

Telegrams from Lima say the editors of the National are all imprisoned, and are not allowed to see even their families. An American photographer, named Richardson, is also imprisoned for caricaturing leading politicians. The American minister at Lima protested unsuccessfully.

PLATFORM OF THE REPUBLICAN PARTY OF VIRGINIA.

The Republican party of Virginia, in Convention assembled, reaffirms their devotion to the principles of the National Republican Party of the United States, as enunciated in the Chicago platform at the last National Convention.

We are in favor of and support the national principle—

A tariff, which, while securing the necessary, shall give incidental protection to American industry.

A national banking system, that shall give us a safe and sound currency, and absolute security to bill-holders.

The policy of extending government aid to the States in improving their rivers and harbors.

The absolute payment of all obligations of the government, and a sufficient yearly reduction of the national debt, until the total of the public determination to ultimately extinguish it, while, at the same time, we carefully avoid burdening the people with useless and unnecessary taxation.

That we heartily endorse the administration of President Grant, and unanimously in favor of his re-nomination in 1872.
