

THURSDAY, Jan. 25. House of Delegates. House met at 12 o'clock. Prayer by Rev. W. A. Campbell, of the Presbyterian church, Manchester. Journal of yesterday read.

BILLS REPORTED. Senate Bill—An act to amend the charter and change the corporate name of the Citizens' Savings Bank of Petersburg.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. The morning hour was exhausted upon education, without action. Mr. Butler presented a petition signed by 35,000 women asking for female suffrage, and saying they only desired a declaratory resolution, as they claimed the right under the constitution.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. Mr. Butler favored early action on the subject. It was referred to the Judiciary Committee.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. Mr. Shellbarger, chairman of the Committee on Finance, reported a resolution directing that committee to inquire: First, Whether the commerce among the several States was injuriously affected by any inadequacy in the present means of land transportation, or by any combination or monopoly in the control or ownership thereof, by means of any excessive or inequitable rates of freight or fair charges by common carriers, or by means of other burdens or restraints imposed on such commerce by carriers; Second, Whether the commerce with foreign nations, and on the coast and waters of the United States or at any port thereof, was subjected to any oppressive or illegal requirements, or restraint under color of quarantine, health or other law or customs of any State;

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. Third, Whether, at any of the ports of the United States American seamen, or foreign immigrants arriving thereat, are subjected to wrong or deprivation which require legislation.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. Fourth, What legislation or other means are requisite to relieve, revive and sustain the tonnage and foreign commerce of the United States. The committee or subcommittee to have power to send for persons and papers, and to sit at such places as may be convenient.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. The resolution, which was reported unanimously from the committee, was adopted.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. The Committee on Revision of Laws this morning unanimously authorized Mr. Sloss, of Alabama, to bring a bill allowing persons in the South having claims against the government, accrued prior to the war, to sue for the same without being required to establish their loyalty.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. The Lieutenant-Governor in the chair. Prayer by Rev. Mr. Deshield.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. Mr. Fitzpatrick, from the Committee on General Laws, presented a resolution asking that the communication from F. S. Ruffin, Esq., in relation to fences and the protection of crops, be ordered to be printed, which was agreed to.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. Mr. Fitzpatrick, from the Joint Committee on the Public Debt, presented a bill for the funding and payment of the public debt [which we have already published].

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. Mr. Thomas, on the part of the minority of the joint committee, presented a report containing the draft of a bill to provide for the payment of interest upon the public debt and for other purposes—which, on his motion, was ordered to be printed. This bill proposes to pay four per cent. on the consols (new bonds) and on two-thirds of the unfunded bonds, interest to be continued at this rate as long as the general Assembly may be pleased to continue. For the two per cent. on the remaining debt, non-interest bearing certificates are to be issued, payable at the pleasure of the General Assembly. All surplus of money remaining in the treasury of the State, after paying four per cent. interest and meeting the current expenses of the government, to be placed in the hands of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, to be used in redeeming the interest certificates in the order of their age. The treasurers and sheriffs are forbidden to receive the coupons now in circulation, for State taxes.

On motion of Mr. Pridmore, the Committee on General Laws were directed to inquire into the number, salaries, and pay of the clerks of committees, pages, porters and employees of the Senate; number of clerks and officers in the basement of the Capitol, and connected with the library department, and their salaries and pay, and report to the Senate what changes, if any, are necessary, and what reduction in their pay or salaries can judiciously be made, consistent with the public service.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. PAY OF SCHOOL TEACHERS. House joint resolution in relation to the payment of balance as due school teachers was taken up, on motion of Mr. Quisenberry, and agreed to.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. AGENT ADJUSTMENT. Senate joint resolution providing for adjournment on the 15th of February of the General Assembly, (introduced by Mr. Nowlin,) was laid on the table, on motion of Mr. Taylor, of Loudoun—ayes, 15; nays, 11.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. BILLS PASSED. Senate bill to change the title and amend the act to incorporate the Farmville, Charlottesville and Standardsville Narrow Gauge Railroad, in force March 28, 1871.

New York, Jan. 24.—The Council of Tammany Sachems have passed a resolution confirming the previous resolution of the Sachems excluding the committee of 1872 from the use of Tammany Hall. They desire to await political developments before surrendering the real estate of the society to any Democratic organization.

THIRTY PUBLISHERS met here last evening, and discussed the international copyright question. A committee was appointed to draw up a bill for the protection of their rights, to be submitted to Congress.

AT A MEETING of the Albany Board of Trade, resolutions were adopted requesting the New York Senators to secure such legislation by Congress as shall establish Albany as a port of entry, in consequence of the lately enforced custom-house regulations.

A verdict has been given against the Knickerbocker Life Insurance company in the case of a policy of \$10,000 upon the life of a suicide named Faber Savorosa, of Savannah.

THREE GENTLEMEN entered a street-car and robbed a passenger without molestation from conductor or driver.

IT IS STATED that Secretary Conklin, of the Market Savings Bank, is a defaulter to the amount of \$100,000.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 24.—The Southern claims commission heard a number of cases to-day, generally of small amounts, and all arising in Virginia, on account of property taken by the government. The claims are: D. F. Dulaney, Mary A. Peyton, Anna M. Johnson, and C. H. Rice; the latter's claim amounting to \$11,000.

THE LOUISIANA committee departed for New Orleans to-night. James Sheppard has been nominated as collector of customs at St. Mary's, Ga.

GENERAL EMORY telegraphs everything quiet in New Orleans, the factions seemingly preparing for the Congressional inauguration.

Mrs. Wharton Acquitted—Held to Bail upon a New Indictment. Annapolis, Jan. 24.—The jury in the case of Mrs. Wharton to-day rendered a verdict of "not guilty" of the charge of poisoning General Ketchum.

Mrs. Wharton was discharged from custody after being admitted to bail upon the indictment of attempting to poison Van Ness. The scene in the court-room was touching, but only murmurs of applause were heard.

Rev. Dr. E. G. Robinson has been elected President of Brown College, at Providence, R. I.

The Wisconsin Legislature instructs its Congressional delegation to support the postal telegraph bill.

The trial of Stokes, for the murder of Fisk, has been postponed on account of the sickness of Judge Ingraham.

A bill has been introduced in the New York Legislature vacating every director's office in the Erie railroad.

Fred Douglas yesterday, registered at the Planter's House in St. Louis, but was denied the privilege of dining there.

There have been no trains on the North Pacific railroad from the West for several days. The road is blocked on both sides of the Cheyenne.

A mutiny on board the bark "Warren Hallett," from Boston for Cape Verd, resulted in one of the crew being killed and another fatally wounded.

It is stated upon the authority of Gen. Young, of Georgia, that Senator Morton will push Herschel V. Johnson's disability bill through the U. S. Senate.

A dispatch from Nashville, Tenn., announces the serious illness of Gen. R. S. Ewell, from pneumonia. His wife died on Tuesday from the same disease.

Scott, McComb, Walters, and other railroad men are looking to the absorption of the Memphis and Little Rock railroad by the Pennsylvania Central combination.

Charles Gillpasee, the dramatic poet, died in Vienna yesterday. He was 81 years old.

The census of Rome has been completed, showing the total population to be 340,000.

Prince Napoleon, who killed Victor Noir, has been elected to the Council of Ajaccio, Corsica.

The observation of the solar eclipse at Melbourne, Australia, was a failure, owing to cloudy weather.

The cholera has entirely disappeared from Constantinople, and clear bills of health are now granted to all departing vessels.

Marshal MacMahon has refused the nomination for the Vice-Presidency of France, tendered to him by the Right Centre.

Trouble is brewing between Spain and France over the harboring of several persons, including slaves, by a French steamer.

The Lord Mayor of London has called a public meeting for Tuesday next in aid of the British expedition for the relief of Dr. Livingstone, the African explorer.

Wealthy houses in Paris, London, and Vienna are making arrangements with the French government for the immediate payment of the German indemnity, due in 1874.

The committee of the French Assembly are ready to report favorably of the abrogation of the commercial treaty with Great Britain. The majority of the committee is still adverse to the taxation of raw material.

Efforts are being made to bring about a fusion of the branches of the house of Orleans. The Count of Paris intends to visit the Count de Chambord, when an attempt will be made to reconcile their conflicting political interests.

The owner of the nuns which were killed by the falling of a span of Walnut-Street bridge, Des Moines, some time since, has brought suit against the city for \$5,000 damages. The city goes \$3,000 better, and enters a cross suit for \$10,000 damages for breaking down the bridge.
