San Francisco, Feb. 14. The rebels who hold Mazatlan have had successes over the federals from Sonora. Arms for the rebels from New York, per steamer "Montana," have been seized by the federals at Acapulco.

The Revolution in Mexico. New York, Feb. 15.—A Matamoros special of the 13th says: "Forty Texans crossed into Mexico, under Juan Guerrero, and threaten Meir. An attack upon Matamoros will follow the fall of San Luis, which is hourly expected."

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Charleston, W. Va., Feb. 15.—The Constitutional Convention yesterday fixed the age and length of residence necessary to enable persons to hold office in the State. The governor and judges must be thirty-five years old; senators twenty-five years, and they must be residents of the State five years before they can be eligible. Elections for county officers and members of the Legislature will be held on the second Tuesday in October. The anti-doubling clause was unanimously adopted.

The Tobacco Tax. Washington, Feb. 15.—The recommendation of the ways and means committee will, probably, be modified by the House, and it looks now as if a uniform tax of six cents would be adopted eventually.

Fire in Toronto. Toronto, Feb. 15.—Nine of eleven wholesale stores, known as "Iron Block," were burned this morning. Total loss on stock and buildings estimated at \$5,000,000.

A United States Senator Requested to Resign. Savannah, Ga., Feb. 15.—A dispatch from Tallahassee says the Assembly of Florida yesterday afternoon, by a large majority, resolved that United States Senator Osborne be requested to resign; setting forth, among other reasons, that his appointment to Federal officers were obstructions to a Republican government.

The Union Pacific Snow Blockade. Omaha, Feb. 15.—The position of the snow-bound trains have been but little changed in the past twenty-four hours. Seventeen trains—the oldest being twenty-eight days from Omaha—are at Creston Summit. There was more snow with high winds last night.

SUMMARY. —Telegraphic communication has been established between Porto Rico and Kingston.

—Granville O. Torbet, formerly editor of the Nashville Union and American, is dead.

—The Methodist Book Concern in Nashville was burned yesterday morning. Loss, \$30,000.

—The report that "Spotted Tail" and his band had perished from cold, is contradicted.

—A fire in Vicksburg, Miss., yesterday morning, destroyed property to the amount of \$75,000.

—A dispatch from Washington announces the confirmation of Lelley, as postmaster of Huntsville, Ala.

—The steamer "Belle Vernon," from Cincinnati for New Orleans, was cut down and sunk by ice. Total value of boat and cargo, \$100,000.

—A Republican legislative caucus in Maine, has elected delegates to the National Convention, and adopted resolutions endorsing Grant and Colfax.

—Gov. Wainwright, the other day, came casually in contact with the irrepressible Carter, in the St. Charles Hotel, and there was an eager crowd expecting the two foes to engage at once in a rough and tumble combat. To the unspeakable disgust of the chivalrous southerners, the governor placidly bowed to the turbulent ex-speaker and shook hands, as though such a thing as anger had never been known to either.
