An Appeal to our Citizens.

LET EVERYBODY RESPOND.

Citizens of Richmond: A snow-storm, such as has been very rarely known here, even in mid-winter, has, this 2nd of March, been raging through the past night and still rages with unabated fury, and with no prospect of abatement. The snow, drifted by a fierce and freezing wind, lies in many places several feet deep. The city was, perhaps, never so ill supplied, and almost destitute of fuel, especially of wood, the chief fuel of the poor, and, to some extent, needed by all. Very many, hoping that there would be little or no more severe weather, are unusually ill supplied with clothing.

The provision made for the poor at the beginning of the winter by the City Council and by the various charitable societies, calculated to last at most only during winter is probably exhausted. The suffering among the poor, and even among those comparatively comfortable under ordinary circumstances, must be extensive and intense. There is reason to fear that not a few, especially of the aged, the sick or infirm will perish from cold or hunger. No human heart can fail to be sickened at the prospect. Never was there a more urgent necessity for the prompt, general and efficient action of all capable of feelings of humanity.

To secure this action the following plan is proposed. There is no time for concerting a better one. Any that is promptly executed, is better than delay.

1st. Let every citizen send to the City Hall such contributions of money, fuel, food, cooked and raw, and of clothing as he may be able to send, carrying some of them himself, if he can, that he may there learn better what further he can do.

2d. Of those who may attend there, let a committee be chosen by those present to take charge of, and issue to distributors, the supplies so sent, until that duty can be assumed by some more permanent committee. Of the others so attending, let all who can, volunteer as distributors to seek out the needy with the supplies sent, the suffering in the city and its suburbs.

3d. Let those engaged in selling fuel and food keep open their stores and coal and wood-yards, during at least half of to-morrow, (Sunday) and let them not only to-morrow, but remember that all that they give in donations of supplies out of profits is "lent unto God," who will multiply it, "mete unto them" in their sorest need, "the measure they mete unto" their fellow-men.

4th. An immediate necessity is a body of men for DISTRIBUTORS, already organized and trained to systematic obedience and action! This can now be found only in the FRAGMENTARY OF SCIENCE FOR UNSCIENTIFIC PEOPLE. By John Tyndall. Price 8c.

5th. Let the City Council at once convene and, without hesitation or debate, promptly and efficiently provide such further measures of relief as may be needed. Let them not be niggard in their appropriations. Humanity before wealth or prosperity, or rather, without humanity, no prosperity can be deserved or hoped for.

THOMAS JEFFERSON.

Extract from a address recently delivered by C. H. Butler, Esq., before the Literary Association of Falls Church, on "Virginia Contributions to the Republic."

Were we to seek for examples of great military renown, of heroic patriotism, of distinguished achievements in the field of oratory or letters; or for examples of unparalleled statesmanship, we have no longer to resort to the historic fields of Marathon or Waterloo, or to the classic halls of Greece or Rome, but we have simply to turn a leaf in our own history, and we find here in our own country and in our own Commonwealth such examples as are unsurpassed by those of any previous age, the thought of which electrifies our hearts with the profoundest emotions. The name of Thomas Jefferson is one of the brightest that adorns the pages of our history. Linked as he was with Henry and Washington in laying the foundations of our Republic; inspired by the same lofty sentiments, and engaged in the same holy cause for liberty, his memory, together with theirs will ever live and be cherished in the hearts of a great and prosperous people. Jefferson may be justly styled a statesman. He entered his political career as a member of the House of Burgesses. It will be remembered that at this juncture of affairs, the House was deliberating upon the American principle of taxation and representation, and was, in consequence of this, dissolved by the Governor, who represented the interests of the Crown. Determined not to have the object of this law, they met on the following day at the memorable Raleigh tavern, and pledged themselves to a non-importation agreement, by which they mutually pledged their vows to forego all the luxuries which they had been accustomed to import from the old world. The measures proposed by Jefferson to ameliorate the condition of the people were in advance of the popular sentiment, but by being continually harassed by parliamentary enactments, the people were at length compelled to accept the measures he had previously recommended. We soon after find him a member of the Second Continental Congress, and in the following words he declared the reasonableness of taking up arms against the unjust impositions on the part of the Crown: "Our cause is just. Our union is perfect. With hearts fortified with these animating affections, we most solemnly, before God and the world, declare that, exerting the utmost energy of those powers which our beneficent Creator hath graciously bestowed upon us, the arms which we have been compelled, by our enemies, to assume, we will in defiance of every hazard, with unabated firmness and perseverance, employ for the preservation of our liberties, being with one mind resolved to die freemen rather than slave-lives." How exalted the intellect, how consecrated the heart of him who, with almost inspired sentiments, penned that imperishable document, the Declaration of Independence. In this production Jefferson reached the summit of his greatness, and this contribution to the world has rendered his name immortal and caused it to be cherished by all whose hearts throbb with a love of liberty. Mr. Jefferson also took great interest in educational matters, and to him, more than to any other man, is due the gratitude of the nation for his wise and philanthropic movement to introduce a system of free common schools, which, for some reason, failed to become an established institution.
