—James L. Brown, an old citizen of Lynchburg, died on Monday.

—Wm. M. Home, sheriff of Fauquier, died at his home in Salem, on Monday last.

—The drought on the lower Rappahannock continues, with a slight shower on Sunday scarcely laid the dust.

—A two-year old child of Major Charles Pickett, of Norfolk, fell into the cistern and was drowned yesterday.

—A portion of "Mantua," 150 acres, near Fredericksburg brought \$2,000 on Saturday, George W. Shepherd purchaser.

—Mr. F. G. Ferris, the contractor for dredging the Rappahannock, is actively at work with some twenty or thirty hands.

—The barn of Mr. McDaniel, near Purcellville, in Loudoun county, was struck by lightning and fired a few nights ago and totally destroyed with its contents, consisting of 1,000 bushels of wheat besides hay and utensils.

—Col. James W. Hinton, Major A. B. Cooke and Capt. E. W. Face, members of the Chappinon Club of Norfolk, have gone to the farm of the sage for a hickory topmast for the pole which the club proposes erecting in his honor.

—A few rude and unprincipled persons created considerable disturbance in the Republican meeting in Alexandria on Monday, which was addressed by Hon. J. Harmer Gilmer.

—Dr. W. Douglas, Republican Presidential elector, and Col. J. B. Sener, Republican nominee for Congress in the First district, addressed a very large meeting at Heathsville, Northumberland county, on Monday last.

—The orators of the mongrel party, though invited to a joint discussion of the questions at issue, fought shy.
