FREDERICKSBURG, Va., Oct. 26. Hon. R. T. Daniels and Col. Wm. S. Gilman spoke at the court-house in this city last night to a good house. The Eighth Virginia District.

ALEXANDRIA, October 29.

To the Editor of the State Journal: The campaign is being carried on vigorously in the Eighth Congressional district, and Colonel Daniels, the Republican candidate, is continually gaining friends and strength by his fair course and eloquent speeches.

His opponent, General Hutton, is one of the fairest and most gentlemanly men that can be found in the Conservative ranks, possessing much personal popularity; and hence the strongest competitor Col. Daniels could be opposed by in the whole district; hence the contest will be the more pleasant and honorable.

I was in company with Colonel D. of the morning, when we chanced to meet Gen. Hutton. A friendly greeting passed, after which Colonel Daniels challenged, in a courteous manner, General Hutton to meet him, before the people, in a joint discussion of the issues in question before the district and country, which the latter promised to do, just as soon as his duties to clients before the courts, would permit; so it is expected that a lively debate will be had, at Alexandria, between these candidates, sometime during the coming week, which all the voters of both parties, ought to attend. Colonel Daniels has been anxious for a public discussion, from the beginning of the campaign, and hence proposed it.

Mr. Lewis McKenzie, the manager of the Washington and Ohio railroad, though a supporter of the Greeley and Brown ticket has been very fair and accommodating toward both parties in furnishing facilities to attend meetings, and is really very friendly to Col. Daniels. Settlement and farming operations in Fairfax and Loudoun counties, have improved largely during the running of this railroad, with Mr. McKenzie as president and superintendent. It is an excellent farming district along the line of this road.

VIRGINIA NEWS.

—We understand that Mr. T. E. Chambliss, of Brunswick, has announced himself as an independent candidate for Congress in the Fourth district.

—The Piedmont Virginian learns that Mr. F. H. Standard, of Mobile, Ala., has sold his beautiful estate known as "Berry Hill," near Orange C. H., containing some 300 acres, with all his stock, farming implements, &c., to Joseph Johnson, Esq., of Louisa county, for the sum of fourteen thousand three hundred dollars.

—George C. Brown, Esq., of Danville, an assignee in bankruptcy, fell off the railroad bridge at Lynchburg yesterday and was killed. He was at Lynchburg attending court, and took a walk out on the bridge when the accident occurred. His body was carried to Danville yesterday evening. Mr. Brown was originally of Buckingham county, and was formerly a prominent merchant of Danville.

—The Alexandria Gazette of Saturday last says that three of the gentlemen connected with the French immigration scheme arrived in Alexandria on Saturday and rode out to Strawberry Hill, a place three and a half miles from that city, which they have rented for temporary purposes. On Tuesday next they will commence inspecting the various tracts of land which have been offered them. Another report says the agents of the immigrants will settle near the Four-mile run, on the Washington and Alexandria railroad, where they have purchased a tract of land for the purpose of building houses and forming a settlement, and also to establish a coal depot. The contractor for building the houses and wharf expected to begin the work of driving the piles for the wharf today. Negotiations have been made to deepen the channel.

STATE FAIR.

Opening of the Twelfth Annual Exhibition—The Weather—The Attendance—Large Entry Lists.

The twelfth annual exhibition of the Virginia State Fair opened this morning, and will continue four days.

The morning opened a tolerably clear and cloudy, with a raw wind blowing, but toward the middle of the day the sun shone brighter, and warmer, and inspired exhibitors and others with new hopes for auspicious weather throughout the week. During the first half of the day the attendance was not large. The time was principally occupied in preparations, and large additions were made to the entry lists.
