UNITED STATES CIRCUIT COURT.—United States vs. Richmond and Danville and Piedmont railroad company, dismissed. A. T. Stewart vs. Kent, Payne & Co., guarantors of Swords & Shaw, was argued and submitted—the court taking time to consider.

THE SPRING FRESHET.

High Water at Lynchburg—River now falling.—Accounts from other points.—No Damage Reported.

LYNCHBURG, May 9.—The James river is now about ten feet above average tide but is rapidly falling. It commenced falling about four o'clock this morning, at which time it was about fifteen feet above average height.

At one time there was grave apprehensions of a repetition of the flood of 1870. It is reported that the water was several feet higher at Lexington than at the time of the great freshet.

Accounts from above report the water unusually high, but falling. At Appomattox the river and canal were nearly of the same level. At one time it was thought that it would impede canal navigation, but as far as ascertained only caused the temporary detention of a few boats.

Further accounts prove all danger over the current of the river is very rapid. As far as ascertained no damage was done.

The Rise in the Dan—Bridges Damaged—Bottom Lands Inundated.—The Water Receding.

DANVILLE, May 9, 1873. (Special to the State Journal.)

The river continued to rise until 12 o'clock last night, when the waters began to subside, leaving the bridge undamaged, except one of the abutments partly undermined, as was also the case with the railroad bridge. The damage to the latter, however, is not sufficient to prevent the passage of trains.

The river has been rapidly falling all day and the receding waters gradually reveal an amount of destruction extremely appalling to property owners along the banks.

From the meagre reports received from the surrounding country it is ascertained that the damage has been very great, washing away mills, bridges, fences, and completely ruining thousands of acres of the best bottom lands on the river and creeks.

High Water at Charlottesville—Water Subsiding.

(Special to the State Journal.)

CHARLOTTESVILLE, May 9.—The river here, which had risen to a considerable extent, creating apprehensions of danger, is now rapidly falling. No damage reported.

LOUISIANA.

The War and Justice Departments Considering the Condition of Affairs.—Governor Kellogg calls for Protection from Domestic Violence.—More Troops will be Furnished if Called for.

WASHINGTON, May 9.—The war and justice departments were occupied nearly all day yesterday with Louisiana matters.

Kellogg has addressed a message to the President, which was immediately forwarded to Chicago, wherein he (Kellogg) announces his inability to maintain himself, and calls, under section 4 article 4 of the constitution, for protection from domestic violence. Pending the answer General Emory's discretionary orders are continued.

A telegram has been sent to General McDowell to put six companies of infantry under marching orders.

Kellogg concludes a dispatch to General Sherman thus: "I try to act with discretion in this most delicate position, and my anxiety to in no wise unnecessarily involve the administration, causes some of our people to think me too moderate."

Marshal Packard, in a dispatch to the attorney-general, alluding to the bogus dispatch from General Sherman to Kellogg, says: "The dispatch creates great alarm and consternation, but it is believed to be a bogus dispatch. Please inform me if any such dispatch has been sent."

Attorney-General Williams concludes a telegram to Kellogg: "So far as I know you have the hearty sympathy of the administration in your efforts to suppress lawlessness and violence."

General Badger telegraphs that so far his Metropolitan has the best of De Blanche. De Blanche, he says, lost heavily.

General Sherman to-day telegraphed to General Emory as follows: "If in your judgment more troops are needed in Louisiana, make your call clear and specific, and we will endeavor to supply them." The United States troops remain at Brashear City. No boats touched at that point. The mail reaches Brashear over land.

WASHINGTON, May 9.—The attorney-general has received the following dispatch from Marshal Packard:

To Hon. G. H. Williams, Attorney-General: I received warrants for the arrest of De Blanche and ten other leaders of the insurrectionary organization at St. Martins. The accused being in arms, and with a strong force, I deemed it best to at once execute the process to prevent the further effusion of blood, and therefore made a requisition on General Emory for a military posse of forty men and two officers, which were promptly furnished. Chief Deputy Marshal De Klyne left with the posse, arriving at Brashear City yesterday (Wednesday) noon, by rail.

The regular line of boats of Price, Hine and Tupper, carrying the United States mails to St. Martins, were withdrawn before the arrival of the deputy marshal, and laid up at Franklin, and the proprietors refuse to use the boats. There is no other water transportation available there, but it may be supplied in a short time by General Emory. General Badger, commanding the state militia, has been at St. Martins five days, whither he repaired to install the local officers. This parish was returned Republican by both the Lynch and Wharton boards.
