IT GREATLY puzzles the Conservatives to know why the industrial and laboring classes of Virginia, the men who work with their own hands and produce all that is produced in the state, sympathize with the Republican party.

We will tell them the reason. The great body of the Republican party is made up of hard-working men; and hard-working men, who toil in the sweat of the brow, always sympathize with each other.

But there is a more cogent reason than that just given. The institution of slavery was an institution founded for the purpose of securing the labor of the working man for nothing.

When the great body of laborers were abject slaves, subject to the orders and liable to the brutality of masters, no laboring man could hold up his head in the community with proper sentiments of self-respect and independence.

And not only was this influence of slavery felt in the localities in which the institution existed, but it was felt in adjoining localities, and more or less pervaded the entire Union.

Well, the Republican party abolished this institution, uprooted it from the land, unchained its victim, and gave him the right to demand the hire which was his due.

There is one thing which the negro man will not do; he will not vote with any party which is opposed to the government of this Union and which complains of the laws of the United States Congress.

As long as parties in any state are divided on the line of sustaining or opposing the national government and its laws, just so long will the colored race be found acting as a body on one side of this line, with the party supporting the government which gave them liberty, citizenship and equal civil rights.

Mr. BARBOUR and General Early washed their hands of the Walker movement of 1869, and General Early left the state convention which declared for Greeley in 1872 in disgust.

But these two gentlemen are in high feather now. They ran the late Conservative convention on the most ancient Bourbon line. They had it all their own way. Kemper is Mr. Barbour's man, Withers is General Early's.

The whole affair means a scornful repudiation of the Conservative "dirt-eating" of 1872 and 1869. It means a restoration of the Bourbons to power.

We are glad to learn that Secretary Richardson will not entrust the investigation of the burning of the Wawaset to the local inspectors at Washington.

The means of escape are wholly inadequate. There is no training among the crews to fit them to act in such an emergency.

The secretary should call upon Congress in the most solemn and emphatic manner for power to remedy these defects. He should summon the best engineers and have a definite plan of action to propound.
