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THE GLASGOW LETTER

The Hon. William A. Jones has recently been reading other letters in connection with his campaign for the United States Senate in opposition to Senator Thomas S. Martin. These last letters are from Mr. Martin to Mr. William A. Glasgow, Jr., who is well known to our people. In consequence of one of these letters in particular Mr. Jones argues that Mr. Martin is not fit to represent Virginia in the United States Senate.

The Gazette does not feel the necessity of expressing the opinion that any letter passing between Senator Martin and one of our own Glasgows would be tainted with moral wrong, and renders either one of them unfit for high official position.

A letter was read by Hon. H. D. Flood at Fredericksburg from Mr. Jones showing that he knew money was being used in his district, and even a negro politician received the attention and consideration of Mr. Jones in the use of money.

In view of this, it would appear that Mr. Jones' action is a hypocritical and skillful attempt to mislead voters.
