

DEEPEST SLEEP.

It Always Occurs During the First Hour of Slumber.

"Yes," said the doctor, "sleep is a very puzzling mystery. Nobody knows what the cause of it is, but we do know that it is always accompanied by anaemia of the brain. In other words, when you sleep the blood drains away from the head to the limbs. If you fell asleep on a balanced bed, the moment you dropped off the foot of the bed would begin to sink, and the deeper the sleep the greater the sink.

"That is why a hot bath tends to sleepiness. It brings the blood to the skin and so lessens the supply in the brain. Curiously enough, great cold has the same effect and for the same reason. You know how cold swells and reddens the hands.

"Recent experiments have shown conclusively how pale and bloodless the brain grows in sleep. How? Well, a piece of bone has been removed from the skull of a puppy and a watchglass inserted instead. The moment the puppy under observation wakes its brain at once grows pink again. No; the puppy doesn't seem to mind it.

"Experiments made by dropping heavy balls have shown that sleep is always at its deepest in the first hour. After that unconsciousness gets shallower and shallower."—London Answers.

Maul Rock.

Among the numerous natural curiosities of West Virginia is one in Lincoln county called the "Maul rock" because of its similarity to a maul. The base of the rock is about a thousand feet above sea level and is made up of large bowlders, says an exchange. The stem of the rock is twenty feet high and will average about seven feet in diameter. The cap, or maul part, is about six feet thick and is thirty-eight feet in circumference. The stem is of a soft formation and is fast crumbling away, since the timber has died that was a great protection from the force of strong winds. By mounting the rock by means of a ladder that is kept there a magnificent view of the West Virginia hills can be obtained.—Christian Science Monitor.


IMPROVING THE PUBLIC SQUARE

Paris, Tex., to Do Away With Un-sightly, Insanitary Spot.

WILL ERECT HISTORICAL HALL

Lives Up to Its Claim of "Largest City of Its Size in the World" by Appropriating \$10,000 to Better Conditions and Promote Local Pride.

The city of Paris, Tex., with a population of 18,000, claims to be "the largest city of its size in the world." Among its progressive undertakings the most recent is the proposed im-



THE PRESENT PUBLIC SQUARE.


provement of the public square by the erection of a unique and interesting building.

The present public square in Paris belies the heritage of the city's name. Judged from its photograph, it is an unsightly, cheerless spot, which contributes little to the enjoyment and benefit of the general public, to which it was dedicated. It is used as a sort of market place and hitching station and as a means of getting somewhere else as speedily as possible. The general sanitary condition of the square is said to be a menace to the general health, and it is evident that some transformation of this part of the public property is imperative.

There is in Paris no suitable and safe repository for historical documents and other objects where they can be properly exhibited, nor is there any fitting memorial art collection or memorial tablet to perpetuate the honor of the pioneers of Lamar county and Paris. These men and women are rapidly passing away, and with them will be lost much valuable historical information if means are not promptly provided for its preservation.

All these considerations have brought about the plans for a building which shall meet the requirements of a memorial collection and shall also provide for the comfort and convenience of the public. Plans have been made for a building to occupy a circle not more than 100 feet in diameter, to cost not more than \$10,000. It is to have four entrances, each side presenting the same pleasing and dignified appearance.

The board of trustees will adopt its own bylaws and choose the time and place of its meetings. Its task will be

to accept or reject exhibits of products, minerals, etc., paintings, photographs and statues of historical and memorial interest, as well as to control the placing of memorial tablets in or upon the building. There is a wise provision that no one shall be eligible to membership on the board of trustees who has not attained the age of thirty years and who has not been a resident of Paris or of Lamar county for at least ten years. Each member must also show a becoming pride in local history and must be conspicuous for his or her broad, liberal and independent recognition of merit. Any citizen of Paris or of the county will have the right to nominate any worthy person to be honored in the ways suggested.
