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Circuit Court Proceedings

The Circuit Court of Rockbridge, Judge Holt presiding, is still in session.

A quietus was put on several applications in court today when Judge Holt ordered recorded that no license to manufacture liquor in a local option district would be granted when such action was opposed by a majority of the good people of the neighborhood.

The People's Industrial and National Orphanage School near Glasgow made application to have erroneous assessment rectified, and the court ordered that the assessments of \$43.61 for the years of 1911 and 1912 be rescinded.

The reports of commissioners on the land damages to J. Henry Leech of \$150 and Thomas E. Johnston of \$100, on account of Moore's Creek pipe line, were confirmed.

The estate of Alexander Fitzgerald, deceased, was committed to Sheriff Morrison for administration.

John Wise, indicted for house-breaking, was convicted and given one year on the State roads.

W. P. Prior, indicted for entering dwelling in night time with intent to steal, was committed to the Negro Reformatory of the State, he being under sixteen years of age.

Milton Pettigrew and Clarence Branson, convicted by Mayor Shields for selling liquor, failing to appear on appeal, the decision of the Mayor was confirmed, \$100 fine and six months on the State roads.

V. M. I. Praised

Richmond Times-Dispatch: Indiana officials seem to have united in an effort to extend words of praise to the Virginia Military Institute. Letters received by Colonel Joseph Button from that source, each contain a complimentary reference to the school.

The occasion is the application of James Stansbury of Anderson, Ind., to enter the institute. In his endorsements he sends a letter from Governor Thomas R. Marshall, Democrat nominee for Vice-President who refers to "the world-famed school." United States Senator John W. Kern, also a friend of the boy, says it is a keen pleasure to see how the fame of the Virginia Institute has penetrated to an Indiana town, while former Governor William T. Durbin, now the Republican nominee for Governor, is equally complimentary, referring to the Institute as "splendid and far wide-famed school."

Suicide of Rev. R. E. Steele

A newspaper report in this morning's papers conveys information of suicide in North Carolina by Rev. Robert E. Steele, former pastor of New Monmouth Presbyterian church. Mr. Steele was for several years at New Monmouth and was an able preacher, a sympathetic pastor and a lovable man. His untimely death will be heard with profound sorrow by his numerous friends in Rockbridge. The dispatch says: Charlotte, N. C., Sept. 10.—Rev. R. E. Steele, a prominent Presbyterian minister of this State, committed suicide today at his home in Lumberton, by taking a drug. No cause can be assigned for the minister taking his life, nothing about his condition having been abnormal during the past few days.

Buried at Fairfield Yesterday

Rev. Stuart Greene, pastor of the Methodist church at Blue Sulphur Springs, who was found dead Sunday afternoon, was buried at Fairfield yesterday afternoon. The body was brought on the Baltimore and Ohio train. The services were conducted by Rev. J. A. Anderson, presiding elder of Lewisburg District, and Rev. J. R. Andrews of Clifton Forge.

Rev. Mr. Greene was a son of the late Mr. L. B. Greene of near Cornwell, Rockbridge county, who died several months ago. He was about 50 years of age.
