The two Heroes, Miss Kerr and McLeod. The two noble heroines, Miss Abbie Kerr and Mary McLeod, of Fairmont, Marion County, who rode from their home to Phillips, a distance of thirty-odd miles, to apprise our forces of the approach of the enemy, arrived in Staunton, by the Western train, on Wednesday night last, and remained till Friday morning, when they went to Richmond.

Vote Under Strange Circumstances—Die, but Never Surrender. We have been informed that the gallant men who were under the command of Captain J. B. Noonan, in the precipitate retreat from Phillips, positively refused, after going a mile or two, to retreat any farther.

Who Shot Col. Kelley? Col. Kelley, the commander of a portion of Lincoln's forces at Phillips, was shot by Archey McClintic of the Bath Cavalry.

Nurse the Sick and Wounded. We have been informed that Mrs. Judge Hopkins, emulating the noble example of Florence Nightingale, is now in Richmond determined to devote her whole attention to making provision for nursing the sick soldiers and such as may be wounded in battle.

A Fine Horse Presented to Gen. Wise. The citizens of this county purchased a fine charger for Gen. Wise, for which they paid the sum of \$300. On Wednesday last, this noble steed, called "Legion," was presented to Gen. Wise, the Commander of the "Partisan Legion."

Meeting of Ladies. The Number Killed and Missing. A correspondent of the Baltimore Sun, writing from Fort Monroe, says that the killed, wounded and missing of the enemy, in the battle at Bethel Church, amounted to about one thousand. Other accounts represent it about four hundred.

The 1st Georgia Regiment. The 1st Georgia Regiment arrived here on Tuesday last and re-embarked Saturday. This Regiment is A No. 1. It is composed of companies which have been organized for several years.

Harriet Lane. The attack by the Harriet Lane on the Pig's Point Battery, June 5th, lasted three-quarters of an hour. According to a letter written on board the Harriet Lane, she received one round shot over the long 32 pounder.

A Soldier Killed. We have been informed that, on Sunday night last, at Shaw's Fork in Pendleton county, one of the soldiers of the 1st Georgia Regiment was killed by another of the same Regiment.

Harper's Ferry Evacuated. Our forces have evacuated Harper's Ferry. A battle may be expected now every day. It is reported that Lincoln's troops in considerable force are now in Berkeley county.

Archbishop Hughes against the War. This distinguished Prelate has published a strong protest against the war policy of Lincoln, and especially that part of the program, which looks to inciting inurrection among the servile population of the South.
