APPRENTICESHIP.—Under this head Horace Greeley gives the following advice: "They say that apprenticeship is distasteful to you and out of fashion with the boys of to-day; if so, I regret it for their sakes. To the youth who asks, 'How shall I obtain an education?' I would answer, 'Learn a trade of a good master. I hold firmly that most boys may thus better acquire the knowledge they need than by spending four years in college.'

It is much better for a young man to devote three or four years to the study of a trade, and then to waste his time and money in preparing to enter the professions of law and medicine, which are already over-crowded. In the present state of the country a trade is a certainty, and the youth who wishes to raise himself to independence without burdening his friends or relatives will certainly prefer a good trade to the unprofitable title of doctor or lawyer. There are too many of the practising lawyers and physicians whose average incomes are not equal to that of a skillful mechanic, and many whose emoluments will not pay current expenses. Let no false pride deter our young men from securing a prize in the lottery of life. If they feel within them some aspirations for public life, let them acquire a trade; for that our future legislators, in the State and national councils, will be taken from the working classes, is as certain as that the sun will rise to-morrow. Skill and energy will command success in trade; the former is only to be acquired by constant practice under a competent master. The latter will come by the habit of daily labor and the determination to acquire wealth and position by a man's own exertions in a world where a *scold's snuff*, and it is such men that build up cities and communities and make nations prosperous at home and respected abroad.

Registration. We present below a list of the counties and election districts, together with the white and the black majorities severally stated; from which it appears that, although there is a majority of white voters in the State of over 12,000, there are nevertheless fifty-nine election districts in which the negroes constitute a majority of the voters, while there are only forty-six in which the whites constitute a majority. This unfortunate state of things is not attributable to any attempt upon the part of General Schofield to gerrymander the State, but is the result of the fact that the negroes almost all reside in Eastern Virginia. Whilst, however, it is possible—we do not consider it by any means probable—that the negroes may constitute the majority of the members of the Convention, yet it will not be in the power of that body to impose upon us a constitution objectionable to the whites, seeing that in voting upon the question of ratification the State will act as a unit, and the strength of the whites will tell. But the question ought to be able easily to secure a majority of the members of the Convention. A glance at the majorities as stated below will show that there are several districts entitled in the aggregate to a majority of members, in each of which the black majority is so small as to amount to nothing when we consider the superiority of the whites in position, influence, education, &c. Besides, there are many whites who have not yet registered, and who will have an opportunity to do so next week.
