SENATE—Saturday, March 12th.—The Senate acted upon the amendments of the House to the Senate bill...

After debate on the tariff bill the House adjourned.

SENATE—Thursday, March 17th.—A resolution looking to distributing the appointments in the Executive Departments pro rata among the States was discussed.

Mr. Sawyer, of South Carolina, spoke during the debate declaring that the South did not have one-tenth of her share of these appointments.

A single Congressional district in the North, he said, had more of them than any one State of the South.

There was considerable discussion upon a resolution looking to the equal distribution of government patronage in Washington.

A bill was introduced to consolidate the Indian tribes under a territorial government.

The Georgia bill was resumed and discussed.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.—Mr. Platt, of Virginia, asked leave to offer a resolution directing the Reconstruction Committee to enquire into the constitutionality of the Enabling Act...

Mr. Brooks, of New York, objected, on the ground that Virginia had been reconstructed several times already.

Mr. Crockett, of Virginia, moved to be recon- strued again.

The resolution to expel Butler of Tennessee for alleged cadet corruption was rejected—yeas 63, nays 62.
