If eaten frequently at breakfast, with coarse bread and butter, without meat, fish or any kind, it has an admirable effect on the general system, after removing constipation, correcting acidities, and cooling the blood. It is more effective than the most approved medicines, if families could be induced to substitute apples, ripe and sound, for pie, cakes and sweetmeats with which children are frequently stuffed, there would be a diminution in the total sum of doctors' bills, in a year, sufficient to lay in a stock of this delicious fruit for the whole season's use.
