A CHEERFUL FARMER—When the earth was parched and drought throughout the length and breadth, and crops were on the verge of total ruin, a Missouri farmer took a cheerful view of the drought and thought of the supply of manure emanating from one of his blessings. Below we give a few of the good results he speaks of.

"I thought produces general health. There is no ague or other malarial diseases that follow upon a wet season, and are the results of an immense vegetable growth."

Protracted drought adds greatly to the destruction of the seeds of the noxious weeds.

The land, like the human body, requires rest, and a drought is rest to the soil. Seasons of perpetual rain, which exhaust the soil, and necessitate the use of costly artificial manures.

There is imprisoned deep down in the earth an inexhaustible supply of manure in the shape of grass that can only be reached by heat. These natural reservoirs of fertility are kept down by the pressure of moisture and cold. They exist in beds of vegetable mould or in virgin soil too deep to be reached by the plow. Every observant farmer who has seen the effect of a drought, and taken from a considerable depth below the surface produce for the first year a luxuriant growth. This evolution of manure, reached only and generally diffused by heat, makes itself beneficially apparent in the next year's crop.

ROLLED APPLE DUMPLINGS—Peel and chop fine tart apples, make a crust of buttered, one teaspoonful of soda, and four ounces of sugar. Roll out the thick, spread with the apple, sprinkle well with sugar and cinnamon, cut in strips two inches wide, roll up like jelly rolls, make up the rolls on an end in a piping pan, putting a teaspoonful of butter on each, put in an oven, and bake fifteen minutes. The rolls are done when the sauce, flavor with brandy if you like.
