THE MEETING OF THE LEGISLATURE.—The Legislature of this State will meet today, the 7th. The contest for the speakership of the House seems to be between Mr. Henry R. Pollard, of King and Queen, and Mr. H. H. Caldwell, of Hanover.

THE RICHMOND WHIG, was conspicuously active, determined to make a show of fight though satisfied there was no hope of retrieving the disasters of the National contests of 1852 and 1856.

The Legislature elected in 1869 had a most important part to act in the history of the Commonwealth. Passing through the disjointed machinery set in motion by what was known as reconstruction after the civil war, that body had the State government to start anew, and to complete the compact as settled by the result of the issue of arms, and to place Virginia in restored relations to the Union.

He entered upon the duties as a member of the Supreme Court in January, 1871, and filled the full term of twelve years. Since that ended, he has been in retirement, devoting a portion of his time to giving attention to his large private interests.

He matriculated at Washington College in 1835, and was graduated with honors in 1838. Many of his class, graduating at the same time, became distinguished men in Virginia and in other States.

After leaving college, Judge Anderson resided with Fleming B. Miller, an eminent lawyer of that day in Fincastle, and soon reached distinction in his profession, which he pursued with great industry till 1852.

In 1852, and just after he had commenced the practice of law, his advent on the political scene occurred, which was at a remarkable period in the history of parties and the country.

Following this movement, a State Convention was called in Virginia, which assembled in the Presbyterian Church in Staunton on the 18th of July, 1852.
