Death of Mr. John T. Stuart.—This gentleman died at his residence in Buena Vista last Friday, the 30th ult., at 6 o'clock in the afternoon after a lingering illness of several weeks. He was 72 years of age. His father was the late Mr. Andrew Stuart, who married Miss McClure, of Riverbend district, and his mother was "Wainwright Grove," near Waynesboro, now owned by Capt. Julian Pratt. Both are dead and are buried at Tinkling Spring Church.

The deceased was married over thirty years, and was trained to mercantile pursuits. Some years since he was connected with the hardware house of Messrs. F. Alexander & Co., of this city. Afterwards he was partner in merchandising with Mr. W. T. Hutchison at Raphine, and whilst there was also identified with the industrial progress at that place. He became interested in the real estate and insurance office and received an extensive patronage. Mr. Blackburn continued from that branch of business a few months since, Mr. Stuart, with new associates, retired from the firm of Stuart & Co. at Buena Vista. Mr. Stuart at one time took with the leading business men and possessed the confidence and respect of the people. Col. John C. Taylor, of Dayton, Ky., has fallen heir to estates in Ireland that make him the Earl of Tyrone, and, better still, give him property valued at \$7,000,000.

Rep. representative O'Ferrall of Virginia has appointed Edward Barrett Gold a cadet at West Point. The appointee is the son of T. D. Gold, chairman of the Clarke county committee.

FIRE IN RICHMOND.—On Friday night about 10 o'clock, whilst the Grand Association Ball was in progress at the theatre, it was discovered that the crockery store on Main street, opposite the Post-office, was on fire. The fire originated from a lamp in the cellar, and the result was the destruction of the building and the stock it contained, including a loss of \$75,000.

The Bell telephone patent monopoly in England has expired. The patent there was granted for fourteen years. Cheap telephony will be the result in England, the same as in Germany, where Bell failed to obtain a patent. In this country the Bell patent will expire March 7, 1893, having been originally granted March 7, 1876, for a term of seventeen years.

At Fort Worth, Texas, Thursday evening, the jury in the case of Rev. Dr. Wm. Mitchell, the Presbyterian minister charged with forgery, brought in a verdict of guilty, fixing his punishment at two years in the penitentiary. The verdict is a surprise, as Dr. Mitchell's bitter enemies admit that his mind was unbalanced.

One hundred and two miners were killed and many seriously injured Jan. 27th, by an explosion of fire-damp in the shaft of the H. C. Frick Company's mine, ten miles from Mount Pleasant, Pa., on the Sewickly branch of the Southwest Branch Railroad.

A special military train, with four hundred soldiers from the Indian campaign at Pine Ridge Agency, South Dakota, collided with a passenger train on the Union Pacific Railroad at Florence, Kansas, Monday night, Jan. 29th, and two soldiers were killed and many injured.
