AN AUGUSTA MAN'S VISIT TO NEW YORK.

An Interesting Description of the Hotels, Churches, Central Park, Broadway, and the Great Shopping Centre of the City.

[For the Spectator-Vindicator] New York, Oct. 22.—Many persons have not the time and opportunity of visiting the large cities, and an account of the travels and observations of others are read with interest by such; I have frequently read such letters myself with pleasure. During my sojourn of a week in the great city of New York I thought a letter to my home and friends would be enjoyed by some.

Now in writing of New York one scarcely knows where to begin. Greater New York, as it is called, embraces several large cities and large towns, all embraced in one municipality; and comprising a population of about 3,500,000 souls. In approaching New York from the South and West you have to leave the cars at Jersey City and cross the majestic Hudson on ferry boats. I think the time will come in the future when bridges will span this stream, although on account of its width it would be a gigantic enterprise. They already have one large bridge across East river connecting New York and Brooklyn. This with innumerable ferry boats cannot accommodate the immense crowds, and they have already decided to build two additional bridges, one of which is nearly completed.

Broadway—this world renowned thoroughfare extending up through the city from the Battery to 169th street, a distance of 14 miles, is one of the most remarkable streets in the world. The buildings are large, imposing and magnificent; they are of marble, granite and sandstone. A countless multitude of people are daily seen on this crowded street, while the constant stream of street cars and vehicles of every description passing up and down Broadway makes crossing from one side to the other extremely dangerous, and not to be attempted by ladies without the aid of a policeman.

The wholesale trade of lower Broadway is immense, while magnificent banks, brokers' offices, and the offices of the different Atlantic steamship companies are to be found here. Middle Broadway has magnificent retail as well as wholesale stores. Upper Broadway at night is beautiful beyond description—with its many colored electric lights, great multitude of elegantly dressed ladies and gentlemen, beautiful stores, brilliantly lighted handsome equipages, attended by liveried servants—all combine to make a picture which neither pen nor pencil can describe. Most of the large theatres are on upper Broadway, the finest hotels in the world are there and on 6th Avenue. The Waldorf-Astoria Hotel is on 6th Avenue and 33rd to 34th streets—it is the largest and finest hotel in the city. From the guide I obtained the following information: It was built eight years ago of granite and Italian marble, is 15 stories high, has 2,000 regular guests beside 600 others who dine at the hotel every day. It has 15 elevators, employs 1,300 helpers—350 on the kitchen floor of whom 105 are cooks. It cost \$9,000,000 to build the hotel and \$3,000,000 to furnish it. They have three-quarters of a million invested in wines and one-half million in cigars. Rooms are from \$5 per day upward. An ordinary meal costs from \$3 to \$4. It has 1,400 rooms, and consumes 191 tons of ice every day. There are hundreds of magnificent hotels here complete in every appointment.

I neglected to state that Broadway and the avenues while apparently running on parallel lines are really not so for it crosses Fifth Avenue diagonally at Madison Square, and Sixth Avenue at 34th street, Seventh Avenue at 43rd street, Columbus Avenue at 70th street, then running between Amsterdam and West End Avenues to 106th street, and then continues on a line of 11th Avenue to 169th street.

PARKS. Mayor Van Wyck said a few days ago that New York had 9,000 acres in public parks, nearly twice as many acres as London has. One cannot but admire the expending millions of dollars in providing and beautifying these parks. For I am sure nothing could contribute more to the health and happiness of the people. Central Park is the most beautiful one in the city; it has 843 acres, shady groves, green lawns, fine drives and walks, and lakes and fountains, shrubbery and flowers, and seats for 10,000 people. The length of the carriage drives are about 9 miles, while the walks are 291 miles. Besides these things there are other attractions. Here you will find a very complete collection of animals and birds all comfortably housed. But the greatest attraction for me was the Metropolitan Museum of Art near the 80th street entrance. One to two days can be profitably and pleasantly spent here. I have not time or space to even mention, much less describe, the thousands of wonderful things to be seen here, a few must suffice. Some of the best works of Michael Angelo, Praxiteles and the other famous sculptors are reproduced in plaster casts from the original in marble. These are grand beyond description and must be seen to be appreciated. The largest and finest collection of paintings in this country are to be seen here. There can be found the works of the old masters, as well as modern paintings by the best artists. The "Horse Fair," by

Rosé Bonheur, was presented to the museum by Cornelius Vanderbilt, it cost \$60,000, this is a magnificent painting. "Friedland," by Meissonier, a painting of Napoleon Bonaparte and his army going into battle was presented to the museum by Henry Tilton, in memory of A. T. Stuart; this painting cost \$70,000. "Napoleon at St. Helena," by Hayden, and "Lord Nelson in the cabin of Victory," presented by J. Pierpont Morgan, are all magnificent paintings. Miss Catharine Wolfe, who died in 1887, bequeathed her entire collection of paintings to the museum; this is a grand collection and is said to have cost one million dollars. Another immense building in Central Park, where music time can profitably be spent is the Museum of Natural History.

CHURCHES. There are more than 1,100 church buildings in the city—all denominations being represented. I visited a few of these churches. The Fifth Avenue Presbyterian church, on 5th Avenue and 56th street, is a large wealthy church. Dr. John Hall was pastor here for many years. His successor died quite recently. St. Thomas' Episcopal church is another large wealthy church on 5th Avenue. St. Patrick's Cathedral (Roman Catholic) is one of the largest and finest churches, it is located on 5th Avenue and occupies the entire block on the east side between 50th and 51st streets, extending back to Madison Avenue. It is of the Gothic style of architecture, built of white marble, and the interior is as fine as the exterior. It has a great many massive marble columns supporting the roof. It cost \$2,500,000. The churches are open every day all day. I attended on Sunday the Madison Avenue Presbyterian church. Dr. Parkhurst and his assistant, Rev. Mr. Coe, were both in the pulpit. Dr. Parkhurst, while making no mention of oratory, delivered an excellent sermon from Romans 7th chap. and 13th verse.

HOW THEY TRAVEL. This city now has a double line of surface street cars on Broadway, the avenues and also on many cross streets and several lines of elevated railroad. These elevated roads carry an immense number of passengers. The cars are drawn by a small steam engine, and there are generally five cars attached to each engine. The seating capacity of each car is 48, and the standing capacity is many more, and often they are taxed to their utmost capacity. Trains are constantly running in both directions day and night, but with the immense population the facilities for the transportation of the people are inadequate, and they are now engaged in excavating for the Rapid Transit tunnel. This tunnel will be on the average about 25 feet below the surface of the ground, it will be 50 feet wide and about 21 miles long. It will be wide enough to admit of four tracks. They are excavating for this tunnel now on 4th Avenue where I saw the men at work, they are also at work on 42nd street and upper Broadway. There are several thousand men employed at this work, and they expect to have the cars running in 1903.

SHOPPING DISTRICT. The principal shopping districts are upper Broadway, 3th Avenue and 23rd street. These streets are generally very much crowded, and there are a many department stores. I visited two of these—Wanamaker's, on Broadway and 10th street. He occupies the immense building erected by the millionaire merchant A. T. Stuart, and carries everything in stock except groceries and liquor. He has 3,000 employes. Seigel & Cooper, on 6th Avenue and 18th street, have an immense department store 9 stories high; everything is carried in stock. Eight elevators are kept constantly busy carrying the crowds from one floor to another. Mr. Cooper informed me that the number of persons employed in this vast building varies from 3,000 to 4,000. He has 3,200 employes at present.

180 PASSENGER TRAINS DAILY. I visited the Grand Central Station at 42nd street. This immense building 250 feet long, 150 feet wide and 6 stories high. It is used by only two roads—the New York Central and New Haven Rys., and I was surprised when I was informed by one of the officials that 180 passenger trains leave the station every 24 hours.

SOUTHERNERS IN NEW YORK. There are about 200,000 Southerners in New York. You will find them everywhere, many of them in the professions, clergymen, lawyers, physicians, also bankers, merchants and other occupations. Some of the most honorable and lucrative positions in the medical profession are filled by Southern men. Daniel Webster the great statesman, was once approached by a young man who inquired if there was any room in the legal profession for another man. His reply was "that there is always room at the top." The truth of this statement has been verified in the experience of more than one young man in New York. I presume there is no city in the Union where merit would be more readily appreciated, and indefatigable labor and indomitable perseverance so richly rewarded as in New York. Yet thousands fail because they are lacking in these essential requirements.

The following gentlemen from Augusta county reside in the city: Mr. John P. East, lawyer; Rev. C. Armand Miller, pastor of a Lutheran church; Dr. R. G. Reese, Dr. Geo. H. Bell, oculists; Dr. W. Baldwin Wayt, general practitioner of medicine. There are other gentlemen from Augusta in business in New York, but I did not meet with them. I am greatly indebted to Mr. East, Dr. Reese, Dr. Wayt, as well as other friends for courtesies received. Dr. Wayt made an engagement with me and took me out driving in Central Park and on the speedway behind a fast horse, a present from his father, Dr. N. Wayt.

I am sure I reflect the sanguine anticipations of their friends when I predict for these gentlemen abundant success in their chosen fields of labor. I have no doubt they will receive honors for themselves and reflect credit on their native county and State.

Flood Waters on Small Streams. The growing demand of waterpower in all parts of the country and for information of all kinds bearing upon the subject has recently led the United States Geological Survey, through its Division of Hydrography, to make a collection of facts and data from widely different sources regarding maximum and unusual floods, particularly in the smaller streams. This information is more and more needed by engineers to assist them in the constructions of such portions of their works as would be seriously affected by a sudden rush of freshet water.

It is interesting to note the new position which the small streams are assuming in economic importance for waterpower and supply, and the growing interest with which they are being regarded. They are worthy the careful study which the Survey is giving them.

DUNKARDS GO TO CHURCH. A Writer Describes Their Peculiar Sunday Customs.

Nelson Lloyd has an interesting article in the current number of "Scribner's" on "Among the Dunkers." The accompanying paragraphs tell of their curious Sunday customs: "So the valley is awake to its Sabbath duties. From its every quarter, along its every road; the rockaways are crawling. They meet at the covered bridge; they move solemnly up the long hill; and our church parade is on. How different it is from that famous one that swings along Fifth Avenue every Sunday, when the human persimmon of every class strut and spread their plumage! Here simplicity is the effect to be obtained, for the keynote of the teaching of these somber folk is humility.

"There, for instance, is the Dunker bishop of the district. He drives a fat horse with a monstrous curly mane and the good animal ambles along as though he is really anxious to make time, but fears to be seen running on Sunday. The brother sits well back in his vehicle and is almost hidden from view by the dust-coated side curtain, but still we can see his great black hat, with its high, cylindrical crown and broad, flat brim. It looks hot these summer days, but it is well in keeping with his heavy brown coat, which has a straight, clerical collar, close buttoned at the throat, is cut away well in front, and sweeps into broad tails behind. The bishop's hair is long and is trimmed off straight just below the ears, which causes it to stick out in most inartistic fashion. His beard is long, too, and his upper lip is clean shaven, for among his people a mustache is a badge of worldliness.

"Beside him is his wife. They have fine faces, the women of these simple sects, and the austere scoop bonnet and the kerchief at the neck almost seem a fitting frame for the countenance of the bishop's helpmate. Her dress, too, is plain in color and cut, and is unornamented by frills or furbelows.

"As it is with the bishop and his companion, so it is with every man and woman in the long line of vehicles bound over the ridges. You have seen them, and, unless you know their faces, you have seen all the brethren and sisters in their solemn procession. Yet there are differences. To the stranger in our valley these differences are so small as to pass unnoticed, but to them so big as to divide them at the Dunker meeting house, to halt some to send some on to the farm with the blue gates, some to the gathering in the grove and others to the barn service."

Theft of Nine Eggs Cost \$250. The legal talent of Caroline county Maryland, has been engaged during the past week in the trial of a venerable man for the larceny of nine eggs. It cost the country \$250 to try the case, which resulted Saturday in the acquittal of the accused. The opposing counsel were State Attorney Towers for the prosecution and ex-Judge Ransom and Mr. Hutson for the defense. Additional jurors had to be summoned to complete the panel. The accused was 73 years of age. The witnesses were subjected to very close cross-examination by ex-Judge Ransom, who wanted to know if the eggs were good. One witness established an alibi for the accused. Ex-Judge Ransom said he had known the defendant for forty years, and it was incredible that he would steal eggs. He argued that the eggs were sound. Nine rotten eggs would have no value at all. The jury stayed out fifteen minutes and returned a verdict of not guilty.
