WHAT'S BECOME OF BALLINGER

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SUPREME COURT HAS

CROWDED DOCKET

All Kinds of Important Cases to be Heard Before That Tribunal Which Begins Its Sessions Today in Richmond. Enough Cases to Occupy Time Till Late Into Spring.

Richmond, Va., Nov. 8.—Its docket crowded with cases of the utmost importance the Supreme Court of Appeals of Virginia begins its winter session Wednesday morning. All kinds of suits will be up for decision—criminal, civil, railway and taxation, and it is probable that the court will have to extend its terms well into the spring of 1911, if it wishes to clear the docket before adjournment.

Among the criminal cases will be the appeals of Dallas Wright, Richard Perkins and Edward Jones, convicted in the Buckingham circuit court of the murder of the Stuart brothers and sentenced to death.

On the civil docket are the appeals of the Williams Printing Company against Clyde Saunders and the Western State Hospital board against the general board of directors of State hospitals for the insane.

An affiliation of the above road will fight one of the most important tax matters. This is the Richmond, Fredericksburg and Potomac railway, which declines to pay certain taxes in to the State treasury, holding that its charter makes it immune from such taxation.
