



LEGISLATURE OF VIRGINIA.

TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 1, 1848. SENATE.

Mr. THOMPSON, from the committee on General Laws, reported a bill for the amendment of the laws relating to the conveyance of land, and to authorize persons in certain cases to remove property in which their children have a future interest from the county...

The SPEAKER laid before the Senate a communication from the Governor, conveying a report of the commissioners to settle the Ohio boundary, which was laid on the table, and ordered to be printed, on motion of Mr. GARRETT.

On motion of Mr. CRUMP, the bill authorizing the raising of a company of Artillery in the county of Fayette, was taken up and passed.

The SPEAKER announced the following committee on Enrolled Bills—Messrs. FRY, Barbee, Carline, Kane, Harwood, Woods and Kinney.

The bill to incorporate the Martinsburg Lyceum, was taken up and passed.

SELECTION OF BRIGADIER GENERAL. In accordance with the joint order, to vote for a Brigadier General of the fifth brigade of militia, and the vote being taken, the result was as follows:

For Col. H. D. Washington—Messrs. Cox, Trible, Kinney, Baptist, Bondurant, Carleton, Wheeler, Smith, Barbee, Kinney, Harwood, Thompson and Fry—12.

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The bill changing the place of holding the regular sessions of the courts of chancery, in the county of Albemarle, came up, and was passed.

The report of the committee to examine the Clerk's office was read and agreed to.

The bill to incorporate the Walker's Creek Turnpike Company, was taken up and passed.

The bill appropriating two hundred thousand dollars for McAdamsing the North Western Turnpike Road came up for consideration.

Mr. BARBE moved an amendment, withdrawing the consent of the Senate to said appropriation for the purpose of constructing a road from the town of Petersburg, in the county of Henrico, via Moorfield, to Green Spring Road, or Patterson's Creek Depot, in the county of Henrico.

Mr. GARRETT moved the indefinite postponement of the bill and amendments, which was afterwards withdrawn, and the bill and amendments were laid on the table and passed.

The Speaker called Mr. BAPTIST to the Chair, and by the unanimous consent of the Senate, in a feeling and appropriate manner, announced the death of John W. Jones, and moved the following preamble and resolutions, which were unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That we are not only called upon to mourn the loss of a friend and courteous and agreeable neighbor, but also to deplore the death of a man who, by his life and his services to his country, has left a name which will be remembered by his countrymen for many generations to come.

Resolved, That we tender to his widow and partner, and afflicted family, our sincere condolence, and assure them of our heartfelt sympathy in this most distressing bereavement.

Resolved, That in testimony of our regard for the deceased, we will wear the usual badge of mourning for 30 days.

Resolved, That a copy of these proceedings be sent by the clerk to the family of the deceased.

On motion of Mr. COX, the Senate adjourned.

HOUSE OF DELEGATES. A communication was received from the Senate stating that they had agreed to the resolution for the election of a Brigadier General of the fifth brigade of militia, and the Speaker laid on the table the bill for the incorporation of Gen. J. R. Wallace.

The SPEAKER laid before the House a communication from the Governor, stating that he had appointed commissioners on behalf of the State to examine the claims of the State on the part of the two States, to adjust the boundary between the two States; that the said commissioners had assembled in the city of Washington and had adjourned sine die without accomplishing the object of their mission, and enclosing a letter from the commissioners of the State announcing the result; which was laid on the table and ordered to be printed.

all things and in all cases both as common law and in Chancery, which is now exercised by the Circuit Superior Courts of Law and Chancery in each of the said counties, cities and towns.

That in lieu of the General Court as now established by law, the five senior Judges for the time being of said Superior Courts of Law shall constitute a General Court, with the same jurisdiction over all things, and in all cases, which is now exercised by the General Court.

That all cases now depending and undetermined in the General Court, in any of the said Circuit Superior Courts of Law and Chancery on the day of March next, shall be transferred to, tried and determined in the General Court, and in the Superior Courts respectively of the said counties, cities and towns established by this act.

That the Clerks of the present General Court and Circuit Superior Courts of Law and Chancery in the counties, cities and towns, shall be Clerks of the General Court and Superior Courts hereby established, and during the unexpired term of their present office, and thereafter the clerks of all the said Courts to be appointed by the County Courts and Judges thereof, and to hold their office as now provided by law, except in the county of Richmond and county of Henrico, as to which Court the Judge thereof shall appoint the clerk; and providing that the County Court of the county of Henrico shall appoint the clerk for the preceding year to—dollars shall be eligible to the clerkship of any of the Courts established by this act.

That the bill provide for a reasonable increase of the salary of the Judges as shall be made by proportion to the increase of labor to be performed by them, and not less in the aggregate compensation to all, than the sum which will be saved by diminishing their number and the saving in mileage.

That the bill provide for the election of the Judges to be assigned to the said 16th circuit, to be commissioned, and to commence their duties on the day of March next.

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adopted, and the bill, as amended, was passed; but there being some misapprehension as to the effect of the bill, on motion of Mr. CRUMP, it was reconsidered. It was then recommitted, on motion of Mr. WITCHEL.

Mr. STRINGER, from the committee for the County of Justice, reported a bill to authorize the sale of real estate belonging to the infant children of Robt. Wilkins, deceased, with the unanimous recommendation that it be rejected. Laid on the table.

Mr. STRINGER reported the bill to provide for the payment of the outstanding claims for the tuition of poor children in Lee county. Being explained by Messrs. KANE and GARRETT, it passed.

The bill to incorporate the Point Pleasant and Ripley Turnpike Company, after being explained by Messrs. FRY and STRINGER, was passed.

The bill making an appropriation for bridges over the Staunton and Potomac rivers, by and for the use of the said rivers, was read and passed.

An act increasing the capital stock of the Shepherdstown and Smithfield Turnpike Company, was read and passed, on motion of Mr. BONDURANT.

The bill divorcing Wm. H. Blackburn from his wife, Sarah, was taken up, on motion of Mr. STANLEY. After remarks from Messrs. STANLEY and GARRETT, the bill was passed.

The bill changing the time of holding the Quarterly Term of the Courts of Wayne, Cabell and Boone, was passed.

"THE MOUNTAIN IN LABOR." Oh! for a Hogarth or a "John Donkey" to sketch the comic scenes of the Whig meeting in the African Church on Tuesday night!

We feel that our pencil is too feeble to convey to our distant readers one tittle of the spot and fun which the heterogeneous elements of Whiggery, in their painful efforts to produce harmony and unity, struck out for the amusement of the Democratic party.

At the invitation of several Whig friends we were present, and took our seat in the gallery, from whence we saw and heard all that occurred. Unlike the Editor of the Whig, who commented on the speakers of the Democratic meeting at the City Hall, as "a man through a glass darkly" from a window across the street, we desired to see and judge for ourselves, and "nothing extenuate nor set down aught in malice," but "plain, unvarnished tale deliver." Our sketch will doubtless be imperfect, but as faithful as our most scrupulous desire to state facts as they occurred will enable us.
