Arrival of the Steamer Georgia. New York Feb. 19th.—The mail steamer Georgia arrived today about noon. She left Chicago on the 7th and Havana on the 14th inst. She brings 86 passengers, having transferred 160 to the steamer Philadelphia for New Orleans, which arrived at Havana on the 14th, and was to sail immediately for New York. The Ohio from New York. The propeller Pioneer, for New York, sailed with 40 passengers.

The Rachel Parker Slave Case. HARRISBURG, Feb. 19.—The legislature has adopted a resolution directing the Governor of Pennsylvania to employ counsel to defend Rachel Parker, confined in the Baltimore jail and held as the fugitive slave of Mr. Schofield, and also to assist in the prosecution of McCroary, charged with kidnapping her from Chester county, Pa.

Delaware Legislature. WILMINGTON, Feb. 19.—The legislature, at Dover, has passed through both branches the resolution to send delegates to the Fourth of July Convention, in Philadelphia, in reference to the erection of monuments to the old Thirteen States, in Independence Square.

Railroad Accident. NEW YORK, Feb. 19.—Three persons were killed yesterday on the Erie Railroad, at Deposit. While the passengers were dining, the freight train ran into the passenger train with full speed, instantly killing three persons, being the only ones on the train. The names of the persons killed are Miss Wisner, of Goshen, an Indian girl, and an unknown man. Mr. Mooney was badly injured.

Sailing of the United States. NEW YORK, Feb. 19.—The steamer U. States, for Chicago, sailed this afternoon, with a full complement of passengers.

Defeat of the Maine Liquor Law. PROVIDENCE, R. I., Feb. 19.—The Maine Liquor Law was today defeated in the Senate, on the motion to amend the House amendments, by a vote of 11 yeas to 20 nays.

Dr. Howell, of Richmond, Va., has been elected to preside over the Sanson street Baptist Church, in Philadelphia.

The Susquehanna River—The New Railroad Track. HAVRE DE GRACE, Feb. 19.—3 P. M.—The ice in the Susquehanna river still remains firm. The railroad company have finished their new track on the ice. The baggage car of the Express train passed over it at noon today. It proved to be perfectly secure. The thermometer this morning at sun rise stood at fourteen degrees, which is the lowest since the 23d inst. The river has fallen several feet since Monday morning.

The Hon. Daniel Webster left this city yesterday evening on his way to New York, where he is to deliver an address before the Historical Society, on Monday evening next, on the occasion of the celebration of the anniversary of Washington's Birthday.—Republic of yesterday.

ARREST OF A MAIL DEPRIVATOR.—We understand that one of the energetic Special Agents of the Post Office Department yesterday arrested William H. Harris, late assistant postmaster at Hainesville, Berkeley county, Virginia, on suspicion of having committed various depredations during the last fall particularly, on letters mailed to and from Williamsport, Maryland.

Previous to his being lodged in jail at Martinsburg, Virginia, it appears he confessed his guilt. The people of this District and Baltimore will especially rejoice at this capture; for, we learn, that a large proportion of the losses and mischiefs perpetrated fell upon them.—Nat. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20. In SENATE, to-day, Mr. HUNTER presented the memorial of members of the Virginia Legislature arguing that the Wheeling Bridge, (known as the Wheeling and Belmont wire Suspension Bridge), is not an obstruction to the navigation of the Ohio River, and praying its protection by Congress. Mr. Hunter, said it was one of the most important commercial questions, ever presented to the Senate. He moved the printing of the memorial—which motion was concurred in, and the memorial was referred to the Committee on the Judiciary.

Mr. BRODHEAD, of Pennsylvania, presented resolutions of the Legislature of that State, declaring the Bridge an obstruction to navigation, and expressing a determination on the part of the State to persist in the suit against the Bridge Company. Mr. B. hoped the Committee on the Judiciary would give the subject the grave consideration to which it was entitled.

The Private Calendar occupied the remainder of the day's sitting. The House spent the day on the Private Calendar.

Death of a Methodist Minister. ALEXANDRIA, Feb. 20. The Rev. STEPHEN BOSZELL, an eminent Minister of the Methodist Episcopal Church, died in this city this morning of pneumonia.

BALTIMORE, Feb. 20. Judge UPTON S. HEATH, of the U. S. District Court, (Maryland Circuit) is reported to be in a dying condition.

ARREST FOR ROBBING U. S. MAIL. PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 20. R. Green was arrested in Greensburg, in this State, yesterday, on the charge of robbing the U. S. mail.

Carvajal Again Giving the Mexicans Trouble. NEW ORLEANS, Feb. 19. An arrival to-day brings later news from the Rio Grande. Carvajal was marching upon Matamoros. Great alarm had been caused among the inhabitants. The women and children fled across the river to Brownsville for safety. General Avolos, commanding the Government troops, was rapidly fortifying a position outside the city of Matamoros. A Mexican steamer, with reinforcements and ammunition, had made an unsuccessful attempt to ascend the Rio Grande. She was forced to return and put to sea.
