FOREIGN NEWS.

By the Steamer Cambria. Below we copy from the Northern papers, received last night, some further intelligence by the steamer Cambria, telegraphed from Halifax:

ENGLAND.

The British Parliament was opened by the Queen in person on the 3d inst. Her Majesty in her speech said that all her relations with foreign powers are of the most friendly character, and refers to the probable completion of a treaty between Germany and Denmark. She calls attention to the recent outrages in Ireland, and promises attention to their more effectual suppression. She also alludes to the satisfactory state of the public revenue, and in conclusion directs attention to the proposed amendment of the Poor Law Bill with reference to the Poor Law Commission.

The House of Commons Sir Benjamin Hall asked for an explanation of the causes which led to Lord Palmerston's resignation. Lord John Russell immediately replied that Lord Palmerston was refractory, and treated the Queen's interrogations with disrespect, acting independently of his colleagues, and unduly reserving approval of the recent coup d'etat of Louis Napoleon.

Lord Palmerston replied at considerable length, which, though damaging his late colleagues, did not improve his own position. He paid a willing and merited eulogium on the character of Mr. Lawrence, the American Minister General London.

The House of Lords nothing of moment had transpired. The Earl of Derby, in his speech on the Queen's address implied his approbation of Napoleon's course. He commended the Ministers for not enforcing the Ecclesiastical Bill, and demanded protection for the interests of agriculture.

An awful disaster took place at Holmes' Farm, in Yorkshire, by the bursting of a reservoir. Sixty to one hundred persons were instantly killed. Great damage was also done to the factories in the neighborhood.

The late heavy flood had also caused great disaster. Father Matthew had been seriously indisposed, but at last accounts was deemed convalescent.

FRANCE. The tranquility of France was still preserved, and a pretty general submission to the new order of things was apparent.

The Abbe Lecocq, and M. Laersdier, popular French Preachers, had received orders to leave France.

A Paris letter states that spies employed by Napoleon are present at all the electoral meetings, and the following are its principal features:—Universal suffrage; all Frenchmen aged 21 years possessing civil and political rights are electors; all electors over 25 years of age, are eligible as Representatives. The number of Deputies is to be 361. Algeria and the Colonies are not entitled to send deputies. Each Department is entitled to one deputy for 35,000 electors.

Jerome Bonaparte as President of the Senate, has a salary of 250,000 francs yearly.

SPAIN. The Queen of Spain took her first airing on the 2d inst. On her way to church an assassin fired a pistol at her carriage, which struck the Queen on the shoulder. The assassin was arrested. The Queen at the latest dates was rapidly recovering from her wound.

THE MARKETS.—There was a quieter feeling in the manufacturing districts, and prices are tending downward, purchasers being disinclined to expand their orders except at lower rates.

MONEY MATTERS.—The general tenor of the London Money Market was favorable.—There was a better feeling with regard to Consols, which sold for money and on accounts at 96 1/2 to 96 3/4.

RETURNS OF THE BANK OF ENGLAND are favorable, showing an increase of £292,000 in the stock of bullion in its vaults, and a total amount of £18,250,000.

American securities were active, and better prices were obtained.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22, 1852. The Congressional Celebration of Washington's Birth Day.

There was a select but not numerous gathering last evening at Willard's Hotel, at the Congressional banquet, celebrating the anniversary of Washington's birth-day, and availing themselves of that occasion to reiterate and re-affirm the doctrine of non-intervention.

Adjournment of Rhode Island Legislature.—The Maine Liquor Law Defeated.

PROVIDENCE, Feb. 21.—The Rhode Island Legislature adjourned sine die last evening.—About the last act of the House was to concur with the vote of the Senate placing \$1,000,000 in the hands of a select committee appointed to receive the expenses of the reception. The Maine liquor law was finally killed in the House, which insisted on its amendments to the Senate bill.
