The Franklin's Advice.

AUSTRIA AND THE UNITED STATES.—We find the following in the correspondence of the London Daily News.

The official papers confirm the fact of a despatch having been received by the last American post, from the Chevalier Huelmann, Austrian Charge d'Affaires at Washington, stating that the Emperor had broken off all diplomatic intercourse with the Government of the United States.

The position of the American representative at this court has long been both difficult and disagreeable. The behavior of both the court and the cabinet toward him has been even suffered to be commented on in the censorious press, and after a residence in Vienna of about twelve months, he is stated never to have been received by the Emperor till within the last week or so, and then very coldly, and in a private audience.

ENGLAND.—In the House of Commons on the 16th ult., Lord John Russell brought forward the second grand measure of the session—to provide for the National defence.

Two thirds of the officers are to be appointed by the Lord Lieutenant, and the remainder by the Crown. It is intended that in places where there is a large police force, such force shall be organized and trained as a militia.

FRANCE.—A circular from M. Persigny to the various prefects throughout the country, apprising them of the way in which the police will be required to act at the approaching elections for the Legislative chamber, is a document by the side of which a Russian ukase or a Chinese edict would appear meagre as the symbol of an honest and civilized despotism.

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CONGRESS.—WEDNESDAY. SENATE.—Numerous petitions against the extension of Woodworth's patent were presented.

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HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.—The House resumed the consideration of the bill granting the right of way and donations of public lands to aid in the construction of railroads in Missouri.

Mr. BARNETT addressed the House in favor of the States—old as well as new—may share in the distribution of the public lands for railroad purposes.

When he concluded, an amendment to this effect, instructing the Committee on Public Lands to report a bill accordingly, was voted upon and rejected—yeas 70, nays 96.

The question was then taken on referring the bill to the Committee of the Whole on the state of the Union, and decided in the affirmative—yeas 77, nays 71.

THE LEHMAN MURDER CASE. PHILADELPHIA, March 3.—Matthias Skupanski and Blaz Skupanski, the Polish refugees, charged with the murder of young Lehman, the partner of Allison and Thompson. The prisoners, however, being unable to understand English, the indictment was translated into Polish, by Colonel Korporansky, before asking them to plead.

DEATH OF THE LAST OF THE BOSTON TEA PARTY.—The last survivor of the Bostonians who threw the tea overboard in the harbor, died at his residence in Chicago, on the 24th of February, at the extraordinary age of one hundred and fifteen years.

ARRIVAL OF THE STEAMER ISABEL—Later from Havana.

CHARLESTON, March 3.—The steamer Isabel arrived about 3 o'clock this morning, having left Havana on the 29th, and Key West on the same evening.

Nothing new had occurred at Havana, though fears were still entertained of another invasion, though not participated in generally.

The Isabel left at Havana the U. S. sloop-of-war Albany.

The Empire City arrived on the 29th from New Orleans.

Molasses continued firm at 1 1/2 cents at Havana until the 27th, when some sales were made at 1 1/2 cents. The price at the out ports was 1 1/2 cents.

KEY WEST, Feb. 29th.—The barque Franklin and cargo was valued at \$33,000. The salvors were awarded one quarter of appraisement, less a quarter, for wharfage, stevedore, labor, and cost of suit.

The barque Telamon was still ashore, and it is doubtful whether she will be got off. A portion of the cargo saved has been attached for salvage, and redeemed by the Capt. for \$6,000, and forwarded to New Orleans by the schr. Governor Anderson.

THE BALTIC.—The Steamship Baltic, weighed anchor yesterday morning, and left this port about a quarter to eight o'clock, under a moderate head of steam. She proceeded down the river in gallant style, saluting the town as she passed.—Alexandria Gazette.

The Latest from France. NEW YORK, March 2.—The Paris letters per the Franklin to the Courier des Etats Unis, announce that a petition was being signed in the Departments and would be presented to the Senate, requesting that body to proclaim the Empire and make it hereditary in the family of Napoleon.

The reports of an insurrection in the Departments of Grand, Heralut and Ardeche, are positively contradicted.

The approaching elections for the Legislative Chamber, are the grand topic of the day. The probability is that they will be entirely in favor of the Government, the opposition having no liberty to enable them to come to an understanding.

The law of the Press will be very severe, and newspapers will be suppressed at the will of the President.
