NEW ORLEANS FIRE DEPARTMENT.—The members of this organization celebrated their fifteenth anniversary on the 4th inst., with a parade, an oration, and various festive entertainments.

"The soldier goes forth to battle for glory or for gold. The intrepid mariner launches his adventurous bark upon the waters, and sees that a just reward will crown his hardy enterprise. Men who do not danger merely for itself; while the valor of avarice is lightly to be valued. But the fireman forgets interest in the promotion of the general good. He leaps amidst a thousand thickest dangers, and asks not for laurels, while he spins his reward. Let the sun of the storm bell come down in a flash, and he bounds forth on his disinterested mission, like a greyhound from the leash. He reaches the spot, where every energy is called at once into action. He mingles in the throng that crowd around the frightful scene. He sees the mighty element at its work. Its fierceness and its strength strike no terror to his soul, but seem to awaken him to redoubled efforts. He watches its forked tongues stream forth from window, chink and cranny. It crackles and roars, as though it mocked man's puny efforts to subdue it. Nothing daunted, he wrestles with it bravely. But should he hear a cry of distress from within, he plants his ladder against the uncertain wall, and through smoke and flames, and falling beams, on, onward, on he pushes still, perchance to save some poor, forsaken child. This is no fancy sketch; there are those before me who have done these things.

"Not, then, from historian's pen or poet's lyre,—not from the common voice of public eulogy, nor in the hackneyed phrase of fame, does the fireman meet his reward. Yet often amid the quietude of peaceful fireside—in the stillness of the silent chamber, do swelling hearts tell their silent gratitude; and mothers, as they clasp their infants to their breasts, send blessings forth to fall upon your heads."

At a late fire in Cambridge, Mass., while the flames were consuming the lower part of the dwelling and threatening the whole building with instant destruction, Mr. Thomas G. Lay, a merchant of Boston, and boarder at the Brattle House, observed in the upper story a female and several children. Without stopping a moment to consider the dangers of attempt to rescue them, he rushed through the wreathing smoke, and for a brief space, the greatest anxiety prevailed in the crowd for his safety. In a moment more he emerged from the burning building, bearing the children in his arms, and followed by the mother. The entire upper part of the building was in a moment after enveloped in flames. Such an act of bravery displayed in the preservation of human life, is worthy of more than a simple newspaper notice.

A Good Shot.—A bear, for some time past carrying on an improper intimacy with the young hogs belonging to the settlers in the Queen's Bush, closed his career last week in rather a singular manner. From a litter of nine in an industrious man's hog-sty, the bear had at times abstracted four, and one night on repeating his visit, the hogs screamed so furiously at the abstraction of one of their brethren that the settler became alarmed, and longed to see his gun in all its trepidation, hastened out to the sty, and seeing the grizzled monster a few paces from him, with the picker in his mouth, he let fly with the musket, and the recoil was so violent that it threw him several feet backward, with his head under the fence. Believing that the blow had been fatal by the bear, and that the monster was upon him, he roared out hideously, and was of course immediately joined by his wife, who disabused him of the idea that anything else but herself was by him.—He then got up, and found his monster antagonist pierced through the neck to the hogsty by the snarl of the gun, he having forgotten in his hurry to abstract it from the weapon, and thus the recoil became so great as to upset him. The bear died immediately, and his carcass amply repaid for the loss of the pig.
