Confirmations by the Senate—Mail Facilities Asked for Virginia. WASHINGTON, March 14.—The Senate yesterday confirmed the nomination of Loma T. White as Consul for San Juan del Sud, Nicaragua, and also that of James Points as Marshal for the District of Virginia.

The residents on the mail route between Washington and Richmond express a great desire to have the benefit of the mail facilities by the night line. New York could thereby be put in twenty-four hours' connection with the valley of Virginia, if night distribution was ordered.

JAMES POINTS, of Virginia, to be Marshal of the United States for the Western District of Virginia.

Heavy Storm. NEW YORK, March 14, 2 P. M.—A heavy Northeast rain storm is prevailing, accompanied by a high wind.

POTOMAC FISHERIES.—The business of potomac fishing upon the Potomac has commenced with quite a prospect of a prosperous season, but owing to the great demand from abroad for shad and herring, those brought to our market Saturday were sold at high prices. Shad sold from one dollar to seventy-five cents a pair, and herring (eight in number) for twenty-five cents a bunch.—Wash. Republic of yesterday.

Escape of Bonny, the Counterfeiter, from Jail. AUGUSTA, March 13.—Horace Bonny, the notorious counterfeiter, escaped from Augusta jail last night. He is supposed to have been aided by friends from the outside, who unlocked four doors and six locks. He was awaiting sentence on two indictments.

Arrest on the Charge of Murder. CLEVELAND, Ohio, March 13.—The city marshal of Montgomery, Alabama, arrested here today a man named Nathan H. Christ, charged with the murder of Theodore Nye, of Cincinnati, at Mobile, on the 25th of February last. Christ has heretofore held a responsible position and done an extensive business at Columbus, but recently had met with peculiar difficulties, and was on bail charged with forgery at the time of the murder.

Lebanon County. HARRISBURG, March 12.—The Lebanon (Pa.) County Convention has selected W. K. King as its senatorial delegate to the Ohio State Convention, from that district, with instructions to vote for Gen. Scott for the Presidency, and James C. Jones, of Tennessee, for the Vice Presidency.

Letter from Chagres and Greytown. NEW YORK, March 14.—The steamer United States has arrived from Chagres, bringing Kingston (Jamaica) dates of the 5th inst. The Kingston Journal learns with regret from Greytown that there is likely to be a misunderstanding between England and the United States, from an attempt made in that quarter similar to the Cuban invasion.

The small pox still lingers at Jamaica. It was reported at Panama that Gen. Herrera was about to resume the Governorship of Central America.

CONGRESSIONAL.

WASHINGTON, March 15. SENATE.—Memorials were presented in favor of the Collins line of steamers—against the removal of the Mint to New York—and for action on the part of the United States in favor of the Irish exiles.

The joint resolutions for continuing the work on the Capitol were taken up.

HOUSE.—The House was occupied the whole day in the discussion of the Homestead Exemption Bill.

Two Weeks Later from California. ARRIVAL OF THE DANL WEBSTER. NEW YORK, March 15.

The steamer Daniel Webster, with two weeks later intelligence from California, arrived today. She brings \$100,000 in specie.

The Revolution in Chili has been suppressed. The Markets generally at San Francisco remain unchanged. Flour has declined, and Provisions remain firm.

The accounts from the Mining Districts are encouraging. A law relative to fugitive slaves has passed the Legislature of California. The civil and war debt of the State is ascertained to be two millions. Indian depredations still continue in certain portions of the country. The remainder of the news by this arrival is generally uninteresting.
