ARRIVAL OF THE NIAGARA.

HALIFAX, March 17.—The Royal Mail steamer Niagara arrived here this morning at 10 o'clock, bringing Liverpool dates of March 6 and 6 passengers.

ENGLAND.—The Anti-Corn Law League was being reviewed. At Manchester a subscription of £10,000 was going forward for the agitation of the question and the re-election of the ministers whose seats had become vacant.

THE MARKETS.—Cotton had been in active demand at all advances. The sales of the week reached 75,540 bales, of which the trade took 33,810 bales, exporters 4,230, and speculators 15,500 bales.
