FOREIGN NEWS.

HALIFAX, March 17.—This steam propeller City of Manchester from Philadelphia, arrived at Liverpool on the 23d inst. The Collins steamer Pacific from New York 21st February, reached Liverpool on the 3d inst.

Large meetings for the purpose of reconstituting the Anti-Corn-Law League had been held at Manchester and Leeds.

The election of the new Ministers, whose names had become vacant in the House of Commons, was going forward. Sir John Lubbock, Secretary, Lord John Lubbock, Chief Commissioner of Woods and Forests, and Lord Henry Lennox, one of the Lords of the Treasury, have been returned.

The Indian Overland Mail had arrived at London, with Calcutta dates to January 21, and Bombay to February 3d.

The Barmess war had commenced in earnest, and the mouths of the Shrawaddy were blockaded. The batteries of Rangoon had been destroyed and three hundred persons killed.

The American Minister and his lady held a grand reception on the 4th. An unusual list of distinguished personages were present—among them the Duke of Wellington, the Prince of Nassau, Baron Hadden, etc.

A serious riot had taken place at Bristol, in consequence of the factory hands of the Great Western cotton works refusing to go through a contracted doorway which had been erected by one of the managers, in order to prevent the girls, who numbered some hundreds, from carrying off cotton waste for the purpose of destroying it. Five engines were sent for, and they poured an immense stream upon the mob, who, becoming exasperated, returned the attack with a shower of stones, and afterwards demolished all the windows of the factory.

Mr. Norris, the American minister at Naples, gave a grand ball on the evening 23d ult., in commemoration of the birth day of Washington. His Excellency Sir W. Kemble, and all the foreign ministers, except the Austrian, were present.

IRELAND.—The Earl of Clarendon had taken leave of Ireland. No notice of his resignation was to be opposed in his re-election for Kildare.

The obsequies of the late Roman Catholic Archbishop of Dublin were celebrated with great pomp, on the 23d inst.

Four free traders had offered themselves for the representation of Cork.

FRANCE.—The National Guards were progressing favorably for the government; here and there was a only number returned by the opposition. The Bank of France had reduced the rate of interest to three per cent. Government was expected to pay a loan shortly. Railroad stocks and bonds, will be discounted as commercial.

The Bank charter is to be extended to the 31st of December, 1857.

PARIS BOURSE, March 17th.—Closing price five per cent, 126 3/4; three per cent, 65 3/4; Bank of France, 270 francs.

The reorganization of the National Guards is going forward. A number of companies and several battalions had been already formed.

General Cavagnari had been elected in the third, the most important district in France. M. Lamourin, though he declined to stand, received 711 votes, against 1,898 recorded for the Government candidate.

Beclia's trial had terminated in a conviction, and was fined 500 francs. The persons who assisted in the circulation of his tracts were each fined 150 francs.

M. Carrot did not obtain the required majority, so that the election in that district will have to be gone over again.

It is rumored that the Pope, at the request of Louis Napoleon, is going to raise the Bishop of Bordeaux to the dignity of Cardinal.

LAGOON.—Messrs. F. & Co. Circular.—Lagoon, March 17th.—There was a very fair demand for Cotton at the close of last week, chiefly however, from the trade, as the sales to speculators are on Friday and Saturday, did not exceed 2,000 bales. The total sales during the month amounted to 23,210 bales, of which 45,130 were on speculation, and 20,039 for export.

Charge of Fraud.—NEW BEDFORD, March 16.—Capt. Chase, of the bark Thomas, of Wiscasset, who had stopped at Pensacola, with his crew in a state of mutiny, is accused of having sold a quantity of oil, composing, in part, the cargo of the vessel, without accounting for the same to the owners. He then discharged several of the crew, paying them with orders drawn on the owners of the vessel, and sailed immediately on unknown business, supposed to be engaged in the slave traffic on the coast of Brazil. The owners sent on by telegraph to have the vessel libeled at Pensacola.

The Flood at Albany.—ALBANY, March 17.—The ice dam broke away between 3 and 4 o'clock last night, and the water in the river has fallen two feet from the highest point. The ice has lodged 9 miles below Albany, and the water has fallen four feet from the highest points. The docks and piers are still inundated, but the river is still falling. The river is clear up to Hyde Park.

Louisiana Whig State Convention.—Nominations of Mr. Fillmore.—BATON ROUGE, March 17.—The Whig State Convention met here to-day, and was largely attended, every parish being represented. Mr. Fillmore, for President, and Mr. Crittenden, for Vice President, were nominated, by acclamation, after which electors were appointed.—The greatest enthusiasm prevails.

Movements of Kossuth.—ST. LOUIS, March 17.—Kossuth will leave here in the steamer Alex. Scott, for New Orleans. The sales of Hungarian bonds only amount to \$700.

THE GALE.—The Norfolk Beacon of Thursday describes the equinoctial gale which commenced Tuesday night and continued all day Wednesday, as having been one of considerable severity. The steamer Herald, one of the finest of the Bay boats, had to put into Cherry-stone, on the Eastern Shore, for safety. A number of vessels were in the steamer Round Wednesday—among them the steamer Round-oke, which left Norfolk that morning, but did not go to sea in consequence of the severity of the weather.

ANOTHER SUMMER RETREAT.—The Norfolk Beacon announces that a site has been purchased at Cape Charles, and arrangements are making for the construction of an establishment there capable of accommodating two hundred persons; and to be ready for their reception by June next.

CONGRESS—THURSDAY.

SENATE.—The CHAIR laid before the Senate several communications from the War Department, in response to resolutions of inquiry heretofore adopted by the Senate.

Mr. Adams presented the joint resolutions of the legislature of Mississippi, in favor of a graduation of the price of the public lands. After the presentation of petitions and reports.

The joint resolutions upon the subject of noninterference were taken up, and Mr. JONES of Tennessee, addressed the Senate in their support.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.—The report of the committee of conference of the two houses on their disagreeing votes on the land warrant assignment bill was adopted.

The House went into Committee of the Whole on the state of the Union, and took up the deficiency bill; when

Mr. SMITH made a speech in support of Young America.

Mr. NABERS, opposed Young America, and gave his views on party questions.

EQUINOCTIAL GALE.—DISASTERS.—We had a full blown equinoctial gale yesterday, which set in about midnight from E. S. E., and continued to blow heavily during the day, gradually backing round to W. N. W., and our paper was blown away.

During the blow, wind N. W., the barque Cora, Horton, came up, and in attempting to round to, for the purpose of dropping her anchor, ran into the ship J. & J. H. Peck, Eaton, lying at Town Point, damaging her so severely that she sank about 10 o'clock. The barque was laden with gunnery, &c., and bound to Petersburg. The barque also ran into the schooner William L., lying at the same wharf, breaking twelve of her schooner's stanchions, and causing her to leak badly. The ship Brewer also sustained slight damage to her head rigging, from the barque. The Cora carried away bow-sprit, head stays, masting, &c. Damage estimated at something near \$5,000.—Norfolk Herald of Thursday.
