The India Rubber Case. The March Term of the U. S. Circuit Court, commenced in this city yesterday.

After the reading of bill and answer by the plaintiff's counsel, and a short discussion, in which Messrs. Choate and Webster took part, the Court adjourned.

Methodist Conference. The Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church commenced its sessions this morning, in the Union Church, Bishop Jones, assisted by Bishop Ware, presiding.

Railroad Accident and Loss of Life. CHARLESTON, March 23.—The train of cars of the Charleston and Hamburg Railroad was thrown off the track to-day, the baggage car scattered, George Eppart of Midway, S. C., instantly killed, and several other passengers injured.

Disasters. HANPTON, Va. March 21.—The barque Sun Beam, of Boston, Capt. Edward Lincoln, from Havana, with sugar and cigars, came ashore about seven miles north of Assington Light House, on the night of the 13th inst.

The Skupinski's Trials. PHILADELPHIA, March 24.—The Court has been occupied all day with the trials of the Skupinski's, for the murder of the boy Lehman. The evidence for the defence will be concluded to-morrow.

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TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

TRANSMITTED FOR THE DAILY DISPATCH LATER FROM EUROPE.

ARRIVAL OF THE STEAMER EUROPA.

Decline in Cotton. NEW YORK, March 25. The steamer Europa arrived here this morning from Liverpool, whence she sailed on the 13th.

Cotton.—A decline of 1/4 had taken place chiefly in the lower grades and middling qualities. Fair Orleans 5 1/4; Middling 5 1/4; fair Upland 5 1/4; Middling 4 1/4.

FRANCE AND SWITZERLAND. The Europa brings the intelligence that Switzerland had acceded to the demands of France for the banishment of political refugees.

THE KAFFIR WAR. News from the Cape received in England brought the highly welcome intelligence that the Kaffir war had been ended by an unconditional surrender of the Kaffirs.

ENGLAND. Parliament reassembled on the 12th inst.—The Free Trade question was broached in the House of Lords. Lord LYNDHURST denounced the efforts of the Anti-Corn Law League to compel a dissolution of Parliament.

FRANCE. A decree has been published in France, declaring the prescribed oath to support the Constitution and the President indispensable to all holding public trusts.

FRANCE. The exclusive control of education hereafter to be exercised by the Church and the State. The abolition of arms in Paris is taking effect—the measures for this purpose being actively carried out.

Further about the Markets. Liverpool Markets depressed. In WHEAT and FLOUR there was a speculative enquiry with an advancing tendency though prices had not changed since the sailing of the Pacific.

Congressional. In SENATE—Petitions were presented in favor of cheap ocean postage—and against the intervention of government in the affairs of foreign nations.

Defalcation in the Suffolk Bank. There are rumors prevalent of a great defalcation in the Suffolk Bank of this city.

Mexico—Rumored Revolt of Canales. A report has been received from Brownsville, which states that Canales has declared against the Government of Mexico.

Whig State Convention. HARRISBURG, March 25. The Whig State Convention assembled here to-day. Hon. Wm. JESSUP was elected President.
