Correspondence of the Dispatch.

WASHINGTON, April 13th.

It is believed that the disaffection in the Whig ranks increases, as the period for the meeting of the National Convention approaches.

Gen. Scott is unquestionably in a predicament; how he will escape, is a problem, the solution of which baffles the judgment of the wisest politicians. The Congressional caucus which convened in the Senate chamber, on Saturday night, agreed in two things, viz: to disagree and to adjourn. The adjournment of that night is deemed unfortunate, so far as Gen. Scott's prospects are involved.

Gen. Scott's prospects are involved. With few exceptions, the South will insist upon the election, by the National Convention, of a platform of principles embracing and endorsing the Compromise, and especially the clause relative to the fugitive slave law; this will be strenuously resisted by the Northern and Western wings of the party, under the leadership of Mr. Fremont. The differences and dissensions are not healed, an irreconcilable antagonism may be the result, engendering disaster and defeat to the Whig party.

I learn to-day that Mr. Clay's health has partially improved; he is still quite feeble. If the present mild weather continues, we hope to see the veteran statesman once more on the Avenue.

Louis Kossuth arrived to-day at half past 3 o'clock, and took lodgings at the National Hotel; he was received without the least parade, circumstance, pomp or show of any kind; he will remain some four or five days, and depart without that "material aid," which perhaps he may anticipate from the "National Metropolis."

CONGRESS—TUESDAY.

SENATE.—On motion of Mr. Hunter, the Senate took up the joint resolution for the extension of the Capitol. He moved that the Senate recede from the amendments to which the House had refused its assent.

After some remarks by Mr. Borland in opposition to the bill, it was agreed to—yeas, 30, nays 16. The bill now requires the signature of the President to become a law.

Mr. Hale introduced a joint resolution for the relief of the laborers on the Capitol. After some discussion on the order of business, the joint resolutions upon non-intervention were taken up, and Mr. Bell addressed the Senate.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.—The House took up the navy discipline bill, and Mr. Stanton, of Tennessee, spoke in its favor.

Mr. Gorman, from the Committee on Printing, made a report on that subject, in which it is said the present contractor has failed to comply with his contract in many instances, and that Mr. Hamilton would not be complied with the contract for paper—receiving enough for all the work, including composition, press work, &c., to pay the price of the paper.

Other gentlemen participated in the debate. There are a number of Finnish fanatics in Norway Lapland, who have lately adopted the practice of conjuring the devil into a young pig, and then boiling the diabolical animal alive. It is presumed that they thereby hoped effectually to settle his satanic majesty.

PENNSYLVANIA COAL TRADE.—The anthracite trade, the past week, has been tolerably active, considering the very bad weather brought down for the week, 26,682 tons, and for the year, 479,024 tons. The Schuylkill Navigation brought down, for the week, 14,125 tons, and for the season, 49,806 tons—some time last season, 13,385 tons.

THE OIL MARKET.—The New Bedford Mercury says that sales have been made this week of 1500 barrels whale oil, at 70 cents per gallon, which is the highest rate ever obtained in that market. A sale of about 500 barrels crude whale oil was made at New London on Saturday at 72c. cash—an advance of 2c; 75 is now asked.
