The latest advices from Paris are of Tues-
day, the 6th inst.

The Emperor was rapidly approaching.

The Minister is filled with accounts of the
presentation of the Cardinal's hat to the Arch-
bishop of Bordeaux, and of the taking of the
oath of allegiance, last night, at the Elysee.—
All the judges, with the exception of two or
three who were absent from illness, took the
oath. On Sunday night the members of the
Court of Cassation and the Cour des Comptes,
the first President and the Procureurs-Gen-
eraux of the Court of Appeal, took the oath
prescribed by the constitution, in the presence
of the President of the republic.
