ARRIVAL OF THE ASIA.

Three Days Later from Europe. New York, April 21.

The steamer Asia arrived this morning about noon, with Liverpool and London dates to April 10th.

Business had been pretty much at a stand still on account of the holidays.

Both Houses of Parliament will reassemble on the 16th inst. The Premier, it is said, intends to dissolve the House in the second week in July.

The Manchester Commercial Association have complained to government that the trade with Spain has been ruined by the operation of the American tariff.

The death of Prince Schwarzenberg has excited considerable interest. The Austrian government has suddenly recalled Count Schwarzenstein from London.

Accounts from Mauritius, received at Liverpool, state that a severe hurricane visited that island on the 23d and 24th of January.

The Bullion of the Bank of England had decreased £219,000.

Trade in the manufacturing districts was checked, and spinners were willing to renew contracts on easier terms.

Letters from Paris state that the 5th of May, the anniversary of Napoleon's death, has been fixed upon as the time for the President's next coup d'etat.

The Paris correspondent of the Independent says that patents of nobility had been issued within a few days past.

Contractors are purchasing horses extensively for the French army.

Two hundred and forty more of the adventurers in the Lingot lottery were aboutenabank at Marseille for California.

Government had granted 50,000 francs to erect a monument to Marshal Ney.

General Lamortiere and Chagnier are understood to have had a meeting at Aux Le Chapelle with the Duc d'Angoulême.

A reciprocity of trade had been established between Tuscany and the Spanish ports.

The consul of Tuscany had peremptorily refused to admit the claims preferred by Lord Granville for an apology and compensation.

The Prussian Minister had left Berlin for the holidays.

A chapel, on the mountain of Zohb, in Silesia, had been swallowed by the sudden opening of the earth.

The Belgian papers state that it is the intention of the Cunard line to establish a line of steamers between Antwerp and Liverpool.

LIVERPOOL, April 10.—The Cotton market after the arrival of the Asia, exhibited increased dullness.

The demand, however, was almost too limited to test the market.

There was no American Pork in market—Bacon was in moderate request at steady rates.

Hams were neglected. Beef moderately active at full prices.

Timothy, Flax and Cloverseed were quiet at irregular rates.

Rice was steady at 19s. for fine. Rosin was very scarce.

The Flood at Pittsburgh.—We gather from the Northern papers of yesterday, the following particulars relative to the flood in the Monongahela.

In the low grounds of Allegheny City—comprising the First and Fourth wards of Pittsburgh, not less than 1,500 families were turned out of their houses.

Along Rebecca street, the water ran in torrents, being six feet deep.

The water passed along Federal, beyond Robinson street, inundating the beautiful residence of General Robinson.
