

SATURDAY, May 1. Senate.

The following bills passed the Senate, to-day: A bill from the House, authorizing Thomas Ash to recover the guns and other property, sunk in an English frigate at Yorktown...

A joint resolution, in relation to the appointment of a select committee, to take into consideration the propriety of reporting a congressional estimate for a tax bill, was taken up and passed.

The resolution from the House, concerning the reprinting of the 1st volume of Leigh's Reports, by Colin & Nowlan, was taken from the table, and passed—Ayes 22, nays 10.

Mr. Martin, from the Special Committee on Free Banking, reported a bill to authorize the business of Free Banking.

A resolution, offered by Mr. Daniel, was adopted, enquiring into the expediency of providing by law that the portions of the counties of Dinwiddie, Chesterfield and Prince George, within the limits of the corporation of the city of Petersburg, shall not, for legal purposes, be considered as portions of said counties.

On motion of Mr. McDonald, the Committee on Banks was instructed to inquire into and report upon the expediency of annually selling one half million of dollars of the stock owned by this Commonwealth in banks, until all such stocks be sold, and of applying the proceeds of such sales to internal improvements, or liquidating the State debt.

On motion of Mr. Wallace, the Committee of Council of Justice was instructed to inquire into the propriety of giving additional powers to the bailiffs of the city of Petersburg.

Mr. Massey presented proceedings of the Council of the city of Alexandria, asking that authority may be granted by the Legislature to the said Council to loan the bonds of the corporation to the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal Company to the amount of \$10,000, to enable said Company to make repairs of damages by the late freight, and he submitted a joint resolution for the purpose indicated, which was adopted.

On motion of Mr. Wallace, the Committee on Banks was instructed to inquire into and report upon the expediency of annually selling one half million of dollars of the stock owned by this Commonwealth in banks, until all such stocks be sold, and of applying the proceeds of such sales to internal improvements, or liquidating the State debt.

Mr. Griffin presented a petition of Z. S. Magruder and others, asking for the establishment of an additional election precinct in the county of Henrico.

The following bills were passed in the House to-day: A bill concerning the Virginia Regiment of Volunteers, (allows the officers of said regiment pay from the date of their election to the time at which they may be mustered into the service of the United States; and cancels all suits on standing on the treasury's books against said officers)—Amending the second section of the act incorporating the Blue Ridge Turnpike Company—Authorizing the establishment of the Merchants and Mechanics' Savings Bank of the City of Richmond—Incorporating the Edinburg Manufacturing Company in the county of Shenandoah—Incorporating the Great Falls Manufacturing Company—Authorizing the County Court of Bedford to sell to the Virginia and Tennessee Railroad Company a certain lot of land—Authorizing the establishment of a bank at Weston, in the county of Lewis—And a bill amending the act for extending the corporate limits of the town of Fredericksburg.

Mr. Tomlin offered the following resolution: Resolved, That when the House adjourns on Monday, the 24th of May, it will, with the consent of the Senate, adjourn sine die.

On motion of Mr. West, the above resolution was laid on the table.

A large number of bills received their first and second reading, and after some time spent upon motions to adjourn, the House, at 3 o'clock, adjourned.

CONGRESS—FRIDAY.

SENATE.—The deficiency bill was taken up, and Mr. Pearce concluded his speech in defence of the administration.

Mr. Gwin spoke in reply, and Mr. Rusk obtained the floor, when the further consideration of the bill was postponed until Monday next.

After an executive session the Senate adjourned until Monday.
