ARRIVAL OF STEAMER CANADA—SEVEN DAYS LATER FROM EUROPE. Activity in the Cotton Market—Heavy Sales—Slight Advance in Prices—Broadstaffs Declining—English Affairs, &c.

MARKETS.—The demand for Cotton, from all classes of purchasers, has been active throughout the week, and the abundance of money, with the favorable advance from America, has kept prices up. The stock is 41,000 bales, of which 27,000 bales are American. The imports of the week are 67,500 bales. The sales of the week are 70,000 bales, of which speculators took 18,000 and exporters 10,000 bales.

Money Market.—The stock market is steady, but transactions are limited—parties awaiting the details of the Budgets. Money continues steady at 1 1/4 per cent. Bankers' 60 days acceptance. United States securities are firm. American eagles are worth 10 1/2 cents.

The Bullion in the Bank of England was £19,063,775. Hare, April 29.—The sales of the week have been 8,700 bales, 700 to arrive. The imports were 12,500 bales. Stock 88,000 bales, of which 64,000 bales were American. Thirty ships, with 65,000 bales, were expected in a fortnight. Orleans 66 1/4 francs.

Commercial advices were dull, but cotton was active and advancing. From the Cape of Good Hope, there is the usual account of skirmishes and bush fights. A correspondent of the Baltimore Sun, writing from Lewis county, Va., gives the following items of news:

On the 19th of April last, Miss Nancy Butcher, a worthy young woman of this county, fell from a walk-log, that had been placed over Paik creek and was drowned. She was about 19 years of age.

Horrible Death.—Mr. John F. Burns, a grocer, in Baltimore, died on Tuesday last from poison communicated to his system by a horse afflicted with glanders. About two weeks since, it appears that the deceased during an administration of medicine, trusted in the animal's mouth his hand; the middle finger of which had been previously cut, and flesh laid open. Through this wound the poisonous virus was absorbed.

Another Cuban Expedition.—The N. Y. Express says that private letters from New Orleans, from an authority likely to be well informed, intimate that the rumors in some of the Southern papers relative to another Expedition for the Invasion of Cuba are by no means without foundation.

Editorial Change.—Mr. A. J. Donelson has disposed of his interest in the Washington Union to his partner, Gen. Armstrong, and will retire from the editorial chair to his private pursuits in Tennessee. It is reported that Edmund Burke will renew his connexion with the Union.

Buffalo Theatre.—Lola Montez danced at the Eagle street Theatre, Buffalo, the night previous to the fire, but having some difficulty with the manager, refused to dance again, and took away her wardrobe. So she lost nothing.

South Carolina Senator.—Wm. F. De Sausure, the new Senator from South Carolina, is an old and distinguished member of the bar, and was an active member of the secession party in the late struggle in that State.

Abolition Convention.—The anniversary meeting of the New York anti-slavery society is in session at Rochester, and is largely attended by male and female fanatics.

Boston, May 11.—Forged checks were paid by the Granite, shoe and Leather and State Banks. They were presented by a colored man, and the police are now on his track. No particulars have transpired.

Movements of Kosuth. Boston, 11.—Kosuth visited West Cambridge, Lexington and Concord to-day, and was received with military and civic demonstrations. He made speeches of considerable length.
