

WASHINGTON, May 20, 1852. It is now deemed very problematical whether either of the two Conventions will endorse the compromise as a part of the platform of principles.

John P. Hale, Preston King, and other prominent Democratic Free Soilers, have pretty clearly intimated the course to be pursued by the Free Soil party, if the compromise is insisted on as a condition.

The South will, in a body, oppose any such fraternization on such grounds. They will not rest satisfied with any equivocal expression of opinion or principles, constituting a party platform. Nor will they yield a cordial support to any man who hesitates to endorse the compromise fully and explicitly, and especially the fugitive slave clause.

The Sun to-day contains a communication from Hon. John Barney, in relation to the recent difficulties between the French Minister, M. Sarrige, and himself.

Mr. Sarrige's statement, he has received many unprovoked personal indignities from the minister either of which would have justified him in inflicting upon this insolent foreign functionary personal chastisement.

Mr. Barney reported his conduct to his government, sending him a copy of his charges, by a friend, who informed the minister that Mr. Barney held himself responsible, in case any thing alleged might be deemed exceptional.

Mr. Barney published his charges against him. The affair is pretty freely commented on here, and the conduct of the Ambassador strongly censured. The General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (New School) commenced its session to-day at the Fourth Presbyterian Church, Ninth street.

To-day the scholars attached to the public school, accompanied by their teachers, joined in procession at the City Hall, in a capitol, where petitions, with upwards of ten thousand signatures, praying an appropriation in aid of the public school system, were formally presented.

CONGRESS—THURSDAY. SENATE.—Among other business, several memorials were presented asking for the passage of the homestead bill.

The Senate proceeded to the consideration of the bill granting to the State of Wisconsin a donation of public lands to aid in the construction of a railroad from the city of Milwaukee to the Mississippi river, and it was ordered to be engrossed for a third reading.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.—The House went into Committee of the Whole on the state of the Union and proceeded to the consideration of bills relating to the Territories of the United States. There was little or nothing done of general interest.
