

Senate.

The following bills were passed to-day: A bill from the House to secure to mechanics and others, payment for labor done and materials furnished in the erection of buildings in the city and county of Alexandria, with amendments: Senate bills reducing the commissions of sheriffs and collectors of taxes; appropriating the public revenue for the fiscal year 1852-3; extending the power of the corporate authorities of the town of Charlottesville to appropriate two thousand dollars to purchase a library, philosophical apparatus and organ for the Institute of the Deaf and Dumb and of the Blind, at Staunton.

A bill to allow the Richmond, Fredericksburg and Potomac Railroad Company to connect with the Orange and Alexandria Railroad, taken up, and after amendments were thereto made and discussion, was laid on the table—Ayes 26, noes 4.

House of Delegates.

On motion of Mr. Wellman, it was resolved that the House will meet hereafter at 9 o'clock, A. M., until the 7th instant.

A bill amending an act to authorize the Valley Mining and Manufacturing Company, and the George's Creek Coal and Iron Company, to construct branch railroads across the Potomac river, and connect with the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad in Hampshire county and for other purposes, was passed.

Mr. Early presented the following preamble and resolutions:

Whereas, certain lands lying in the Military district, between the Miami and Scioto rivers, in the State of Ohio, are bound for the payment of the land bounties promised by Virginia to her officers and soldiers, for services in the War of the Revolution, having been by her reserved for that object;

And whereas, a bill is now pending before the Congress of the United States, providing for an appropriation of nine hundred and fifty thousand acres of land scrip for the satisfaction of the Virginia military land warrants now outstanding and unsatisfied;

Therefore, Resolved by the General Assembly, That in the event of the passage of a law by Congress, making an appropriation of scrip to the amount aforesaid, for the object aforesaid, the said appropriation be, and it is hereby accepted, as a full discharge of all claims of this State against the United States on account of the land bounties aforesaid, and that in the event of the passage of such a law by Congress, the Governor of this Commonwealth be, and he is hereby authorized and required to execute a proper deed ceding and conveying to the United States all the right, title, and interest of this State, of, in, and to the lands between the Miami and Scioto rivers, in the State of Ohio.

Resolved, That the Governor of this Commonwealth transmit to each of our Senators and Representatives in Congress, a copy of the foregoing preamble and resolutions.

The preamble and resolutions were adopted, and sent to the Senate, asking the concurrence of that body.

The consideration of the tax bill from the Senate was resumed, and Mr. Goode, of M., took the floor and occupied about two hours in continuation of his remarks suspended the day before by indisposition. He was followed by Mr. Rives, of Albemarle, in reply, and discussion on the bill was continued up to the hour of adjournment about 3 o'clock. The evening session was principally occupied with the same subject.

CONGRESS—THURSDAY.

SENATE.—Reports were received from the Secretary of War and of the Treasury, relative to deepening the flats of Lake St. Clair, and a contract for removing the wreck of the Missouri.

A petition was presented from Chemung county, New York, for the repeal of the fugitive slave law, and it was laid on the table.

Petitions were presented in favor of the homestead bill; various other bills of a private nature were discussed; and it was agreed that when the Senate adjourn, it adjourn to meet on Monday next.
