TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Later from Mexico—Tehuantepec Grant. New Orleans, June 7.—Advice from the City of Mexico to the 19th states that the Government has published a decree, signed by President Arista and the officers of Congress, which sets forth that the government is willing to receive a contract to promote the formation of a company to build a railroad, canal, or wagon road, on the Tehuantepec route. The approval of a Congress of Nations to the contract is preferred, as Mexico has not lost sovereignty to the Isthmus.

WASHINGTON, June 11. In the SENATE, private bills were postponed till one o'clock. A resolution was adopted calling for any information that may have been received from Mexico by Government relative to the Gardiner Claim. The Senate then went into executive session. The House resolved itself into committee of the Whole on the Indian appropriation bill. The committee of ways and means have determined to report in favor of the Senate amendment relative to the Collins steamers.

Later from Rio Janeiro. The clipper ship Black Squall, Capt. Codman, arrived at New York on Wednesday, after a splendid run from Cape Town and Rio de Janeiro, which latter port she left May 14. Freight being scarce and low, the Black Squall merely anchored outside the forts and did not find sufficient inducement to enter and fill up.
