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THE GREAT FIRE AT WETUMPKA. A dispatch from Charleston, gives the following particulars of the late conflagration at Wetumpka, Ala., announced yesterday under our telegraphic head:

A fire occurred at Wetumpka, Ala., at two o'clock on Saturday morning, in an old warehouse, and in two hours' time the entire business part of East Wetumpka was destroyed.

FIRE AT SAVANNAH. A fire broke out in Lopez Cohen's carpenter shop, Savannah, on Monday morning, destroying the shop and its contents, and Cohen's large brick dwelling on Jones st., with nearly all the furniture--loss \$100,000.

RIOT AND BLOODSHED. A few days since an infuriated crowd of Irishmen tore down the jail at Falmouth, Ky., and murdered the jailor, to avenge the incarceration of a countryman of theirs.

FRENCH. At Mobile, on the 8th, a ruffian stole the yacht Kate, and ran her aground before the city.

While stretched forward to clutch her, the infuriated beast lifted the tiller, and struck Wilson a blow across the head and neck, that at once stunned him.

Wilson was rescued and the fiend captured by some Spanish fishermen. He is thought to be an escaped galley slave from some part of France; but until poor Wilson is enabled to give some testimony, few reliable particulars of him can be obtained.

FIRE AND LOSS OF LIFE. We extract the following particulars of the burning of Washington's Head Quarters, in N. York:

The fire originated in the fourth story, and so suddenly did the flames come upon the inmates, that a woman--before the firemen could reach her, and in order, as she no doubt supposed, to save herself from the devouring element--jumped from one of the fifth-story windows, and was forced through a tin-roofed awning on to the sidewalk.

FOUND DROWNED. A man named Wm. Gulleger was found in Pea river, Pike Co., Ala., on the 3d. In attempting to cross a bridge, the river being very high, he was thrown from his horse, and drowned.

FLAG PRESENTATION. The ceremony of presenting a new flag to the City Guard, of Petersburg, took place on Tuesday.

FIRE AT TROY. The Renselear County Fair Buildings, at Troy, N. Y., were destroyed by fire on Monday.

SINGULAR. The N. O. Picayune says that the body of Judge B. Barro, who died two years since and was buried in the sand at Biloxi, near the salt water, has been discovered by the Odd Fellows for reburial, and the body found in a perfect state of preservation.

FRESHET. There was a great freshet in the Saluda river, (S. C.) last week. Bridges were swept away, and property destroyed to a considerable extent.
