THE DAILY DISPATCH. NATIONAL WHIG CONVENTION. THIRD DAY. Friday, June 18. MORNING SESSION.

The Convention was called to order by the President, Gen. Chapman, a few minutes after 10 o'clock, when an eloquent and fervent prayer was offered by the Rev. Dr. Hamner.

When the Convention adjourned last evening, it had under consideration the amendment proposed by Gen'l Jessup, to the following substitute proposed by Mr. Ewing.

Resolved, That the Committee shall consist of one delegate from each State, selected by the delegates of said State.

Mr. Allen, of Tennessee, offered a preamble and resolutions prepared by Southern delegations, which he proposed to refer to the committee on the platform without reading.

Mr. G. W. Davis, of Florida, offered a resolution, that the Whigs would support no man whose principles were not clearly understood.

Mr. Van Trump, of Ohio moved to go into the nomination of President and Vice President at once, but the chair decided that the motion was not in order, and the vote was then (12 o'clock) taken by States on a motion to adjourn until 5 minutes past 6 o'clock this afternoon.

Republican is not to propagate our opinions, or impose on other countries our form of government, by article or force, but to teach by example and show by our success, moderation and justice, the blessings of self-government and the advantages of free institutions.

4. That where the people make and control the Government, they should obey its Constitution, laws and treaties, as they would retain their self-respect, and the respect which they claim and will enforce from foreign powers.

5. Government should be conducted on principles of strictest economy, and revenue sufficient for its expenses thereof in time of peace, ought to be derived from a duty on imports, and not from direct taxes; and in laying such duties, sound policy requires a just discrimination, whereby suitable encouragement may be afforded to American industry, equally to all classes and to all portions of the country.

6. The Constitution vests in Congress the power to open and repair harbors, and it is expedient that Congress should exercise its power to remove obstructions from navigable rivers, whenever such improvements are necessary for the common defence and for the protection and facility of commerce with foreign nations or among the States; said improvements being, in every instance, national and general in their character.

7. The Federal and State Governments are parts of one system, alike necessary for the common prosperity, peace and security, and ought to be regarded alike, with a cordial, habitual and immovable attachment. Respect for the authority of each, and acquiescence in the constitutional measures of each, are duties required by the plainest considerations of national, State, and of individual welfare.

8. That the series of Acts of the 31st Congress: the Act known as the Fugitive Slave Law in which the U. S. States as a settlement in principle and substance of the dangerous and exciting questions which they embrace, and so far as they are concerned, we will maintain them and insist upon their strict enforcement until time and experience shall demonstrate the necessity of further legislation to guard against evasion of the laws on the one hand, and not impairing their present efficiency, and we deprecate all further agitation of the questions thus settled as dangerous to our peace and will discountenance all efforts to continue or renew such agitation whenever, wherever or however the attempt may be made; we will maintain this system as essential to the Nationality of the Whig party and the integrity of the Union.

9. The resolutions they were read, were severally received with demonstrations of applause, especially those relating to the Compromise measures.

A debate then arose upon the adoption of the resolutions or Platform. Mr. Rufus Choate of Massachusetts, sustained at length, and Mr. Charles Anderson of Ohio, opposed it.

Mr. Duncan proposed that his third resolution be informally passed over until the Committee on Credentials shall have reported; which was agreed to.

EARTHQUAKE IN SOUTH WALES.—The shock of an earthquake was distinctly felt on Thursday morning in this town and neighborhood. PORTUGAL. The Cortes met on 20th May. The Court das Autas had died in Lisbon. His name appeared prominently in public affairs for several years past.

Spain. A royal decree announces that Spanish and foreign ships may touch at the Canary Islands, in transit or on their way to other ports, during the months of June, July and August of the present year, exempt for six days from anchorage or loading dues.

Government had received despatches from the Philippine Islands to 16th March. On 13th, an expedition consisting of one regiment, two steamships and three frigates, sailed for Manila for the island of Mindanao, to erect military works at Puerto Palao for the defence of that town.

Accounts from Piedmont state that parties are agreed on the expediency of reducing the amount of the Roman police.

Italy. The Roman police are using every means to prevent the introduction of foreign newspapers into the Papal States.
