CONGRESS-FRIDAY.

In the Senate Friday, the Florida contest election case was decided by declaring Mr. Mallory to be the duly elected Senator.

The House of Representatives, among other business transacted Friday, elected General Robert Armstrong, proprietor of the Union newspaper, Public Printer for that body, to serve during the remainder of the Congress.

Mr. Johnson, of Tennessee, made an unsuccessful attempt to submit a report from the select committee appointed to investigate the facts touching the resignation of Secretary Corwin therewith; the substance of which was that there will not be time during the present session for them to act in the premises.

SACS AND FOXES.—The delegates of the ancient tribe of Indians, from the Osage river, west of the State of Missouri, who arrived in Washington on Tuesday evening, visited the Department of the Commissioner of Indian Affairs.

The young Keokuk has a remarkably fine eye and face; and a son of the celebrated Black Hawk, though of rather settled countenance, is at least remarkable for his bulk of frame and characteristic marks of firmness.

The Indians expressed themselves gratified at the assurances given, and took a respectful leave of the delegation.

THE FISHERY TROUBLES.—The advice by the steamer Asia are to the effect that there is a generally received report in England that Thomas Barine, of the well known firm of Barine Brothers & Co., is about to visit the United States on a special mission from the British Government for the arrangement of a fishery dispute.

"We have been put in possession of private letters, of the highest authority, which place this matter in a somewhat different light. Mr. Barine positively declines any 'diplomatic agency' in the matter—his visit to this country being originally planned on account of his own business operations."

All the private letters by the steamer, as well as the tone of the leading English papers, would seem to indicate the most pacific state of feeling on the other side of the Atlantic.

"The report in the London Standard, that American stocks were about to be sent out in the Asia for resale is not confirmed by the private letter. No intimation of that kind has been made to several of the prominent houses connected with England on this side."
