Money Matters, &c. The N. Y. Express says of the Stock Market on Saturday afternoon:

SINGULAR DELUSION.—Kossuth King of America.—Mr. Kendall, in a late letter from Paris, to the New Orleans Picayune, tells the following singular story:

"I will close this letter by mentioning the fact that a most unaccountable whim, if I may so call it, has recently entered into the heads of the lower classes in Posen, Galicia, and has even spread into some parts of Bohemia and Hungary, if accounts be true.

According to the papers (you may have already seen the report) it would seem that a story had got out, and that it flew abroad with the greatest rapidity, to the effect that the richest family in the Rothschilds was under sentence of death in the only chance of saving his life was through the means of a lottery. For this purpose he offered what our lottery vendors would call a brilliant scheme, the main features of which were as follows: His entire property was to be divided into sums of 3000 francs, and any and all who chose to take a ticket in the lottery, gratis, of course, would certainly draw that amount in yellow gold, save one person only! In plain terms, every ticket placed in an immense wheel except one had a number upon it, and was to draw a prize of 3000 francs; but the holder of the only blank was to offer his head to the chopping block of the guillotine of the day.

Notwithstanding the risk of drawing the blank, it is positively asserted that the rush for tickets to many of the towns and villages has been immense. The magistrates as well as the military authorities have had the greatest difficulty in convincing the poor farmers and peasants that there is no such lottery in existence, and thousands have been sent away disappointed, because they have been deprived of the chance of drawing 3,000 francs at the trifling risk of gracing an executioner's block. This is an age of progress and advancement.

In the same section where the above strange excitement has prevailed, it is also said that the idea obtains that Kossuth has been proclaimed King of America, and that he is shortly to appear again in Europe at the head of his immense army. That such a story as this should get abroad is not singular, however, as the lottery scheme hoax, for accounts of Kossuth's first reception in the States might lead the masses of Europe to believe almost anything.

MR. CLAY AND GEN. SCOTT.—Mr. Thomas H. Clay has addressed a letter to the editor of the Nashville Banner, in which he says, "my father never advised me not to vote for Gen. Scott, and it is my determination, if I live, to vote for Scott and Graham for President and Vice President of the United States. The manifesto of the Southern members of Congress, who refused to support Gen. Scott, was neither prepared by the advice nor approbation of my father."

DUEL ABANDONED.—The Washington Telegraph of Monday, says: The contemplated or reported affair between Dr. Collins and Colonel Cunningham, is finally disposed of. The case came up for further hearing before Justices Grubb and Goddard, this morning, Judge Bayly appearing for Mr. Doyle, and Mr. Burwell for Colonel Cunningham. Justice Goddard, after swearing Colonel Cunningham, asked the latter what he knew relative to the carrying of a challenge from Dr. Collins to himself? Colonel Cunningham declined answering any questions. The Justices, after consulting, decided to dismiss the case for want of evidence, and if no was dismissed. It is understood that if any duel was contemplated, the purpose has been abandoned by the parties.

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ALLEGED INTIMIDATION AND LIBEL OF A FOREIGN MINISTER.—Mr. Francis Dodge of Georgetown, was yesterday brought before Justice Goddard, at the instance of the Secretary of State, on a complaint made by the Chevalier de Boeck, Spencer, Minister of the Belgian government near the United States, growing out of a difficulty in relation to impounding a cow or cows, and a letter said to have been written by said Dodge to the Minister. Mr. Dodge was held to bail in the sum of \$500, to appear at the next term of the criminal court, to answer the charge of "intimidating," and in the meantime to keep the peace towards the Minister. It also appearing that some strictures in regard to the matter had been published in the Georgetown Reporter, the editor of that paper, Mr. Joseph A. Williamson, was likewise put under security, upon complaint of the Minister, to answer at court a charge of having published libellous matter. The bail in this case was given in the sum of \$500.—Wash. Rep. of yesterday.

Items In Georgia the agricultural prospects were never brighter than at present. The corn crop is very large. In Kentucky the corn and tobacco are suffering severely from drought, in Grayson and adjoining counties. There had been no rain for forty days. The farmers despaired of making any crop at all. Mrs. Hartman, widow of the murdered man at Buffalo, is fast recovering from her injuries. Rev. John L. Hill, of the Nashville Circuit, Tennessee Conference, died on the 13th ult. The first Sabbath School in the Western States was established in Ohio. Seven negroes belonging to T. & J. Arterburn of Louisville, Ky., ran away on Tuesday night. A fire in Covington, Ky., destroyed two dwelling houses, three stables, and a tobacco warehouse, owned by a Mr. Moore. Otego Hall, the late residence of J. Fenimore Cooper, is about to be converted into a hotel. It was built by the novelist's father. Peaches are selling in New York at from fifty cents to one dollar per basket holding about three pecks. Several Indians, the descendants of eminent western war-chiefs, are engaged as firemen and dock hands on the Ohio river steamer. The celebrated trotting horse Reindeer was sold at auction on Wednesday, in Brooklyn, to Mr. Read, for \$1075. Henry Caminade, who served as a volunteer in nearly all the battles in Mexico, died suddenly at Charleston, on Tuesday. Macaulay has finished two more volumes of his history of England, and will publish them this winter. The Kanawha Co. have advanced the price of oil to 25c. per bushel, the former is the wholesale and the latter the retail price. Legare, who escaped from jail at Westminster, Md., was retaken at his house in Carroll county, last week. The hay crop of the United States, this year, is about one-third below an average, but of better quality than last year. A man named Erastus Merrill, aged 57 years, and living in Buffalo, committed suicide on Sunday forenoon by hanging himself. He had for some time been deranged. A German, named Daniel Martin, about 35 years old, drowned himself in the river, at Newark, on Saturday noon. Family difficulties and inter-pretations induced him to commit the deed. The Chamber of Commerce of Cincinnati, have decided that musty whiskey is unmerchantable, and that the seller is responsible to the purchaser when an unmerchantable article is sold. Peter Faneuil, who built the celebrated hall in Boston, that bears his name, was a French Huguenot, who was banished from France by an edict against civil dissenters in 1685.
