IN Henrico County Court, Oct. 6, 1852. The Justices of this Court having been summoned to attend this day to determine whether or not the 33rd section of the 18th chapter of the Code of Virginia, which prescribes that "if a free negro shall sell or barter, or offer for sale or barter any agricultural products without having a certain order in writing from the respectable white person of the county or neighborhood, of his belief that he raised or otherwise came honestly by the same, such products shall be forfeited and the negro punished as a felon, and that any white person who shall purchase or receive in trade agricultural products of a free negro who has not such certificate, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor," shall be in force in the County of Henrico. The Court this day proceeded to consider the same, and it is the unanimous opinion of the Court that the section aforesaid shall be in force in the County of Henrico, and the same is so ordered accordingly. And it is further ordered that the order be published twice a week for one month, in the Daily Dispatch and Richmond Daily Enquirer.
