

THE LATEST NEWS.

Dreadful Steamboat Explosion and Loss of Life. PITTSBURGH, Nov. 13.—The mail packet Mckeay Belle exploded both boilers last evening about 4 o'clock, in the locks at Beverly, 12 miles from Marietta. No ladies were injured. The killed, as far as known, are John Harbour, of Pittsburgh, produce dealer; Joseph Daniels, engineer; John West, Edward Atherton, of Beverly; Wm. Stull, a negro man, formerly Butler, and 19 others. The injured are: Capt. Hahn, arm broken and badly scalded; Wm. Whisson, first clerk; leg broken and feet and ankles mashed;—he will probably die; Calvin Stull; Joe Covey, leg broken; Edward Blackwar, and many others. The boat was on fire completely in places. Every line of one boiler collapsed, and the other boiler cannot stand. The accident is attributed to the gross recklessness of the engineers, one of whom was on the safety valve at the time of the explosion. The carpenter says he told the engineer there was too much steam on five minutes before the accident.

A Wife Murdered.—A lady named Traskway was killed by her husband on Thursday at Halloway, about four miles from Salem, N. J. She had sued him for a separate maintenance, and obtained a verdict in her favor. He repaired to the house where she boarded and fired at her through the window. The ball passed through her head, and she instantly fell.

Arrival of the Steamer City of Glasgow. PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 14.—The steamship City of Glasgow arrived here at 5 o'clock this morning, from Liverpool, bringing 103 passengers. She sailed previous to the Niagara, and, of course, brings no news. The Bishop of Glasgow is among the passengers in the Glasgow.

Murder.—A negro employed on a schooner loading at this place was struck on the head to-day with a handspike by one of the crew, killing him instantly. The names of the parties are not known. It appears that the negro refused to go on shore when ordered.

Shocking Butchery. HOLLIDAYSBURG, Pa., Nov. 13.—Last night a man named Jas. Skiffley, residing between Liberty and Freedom, attacked his wife with a butcher knife, and cut her brains out. He is supposed to be insane.

Accident at the St. Charles Hotel. NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 12.—Mr. Purvis, the distinguished architect, who is building the St. Charles Hotel from the seafront and was severely mangled. It is feared he cannot recover.

A DORSETT STORY.—A Boston correspondent of the Woonsocket (R. I.) Patriot tells this remarkable story about Jenny Lind: that she has been sprung up between her and her husband, and that she has become insane. The writer says, "I have known her, myself, who is pointed in the same city with Lind for several months, previous to coming to America, and visited her mansion almost daily."

Mr. Whitmore, of the firm of Bradley, Whitmore & Co., contractors for finishing the Central Ohio Railroad from Zanesville to Wheeling, was killed on Wednesday last, at Zanesville, by a lever bar striking him and throwing him down an embankment, among rocks, a distance of 20 feet.

A difficulty between ex-Governor Jones and the Hon. F. P. Stanton, of Tenn., was amicably adjusted.

Captain Joseph W. Gray, of Berkeley county, has resigned his seat in the Virginia house of delegates.
