MR. WEBSTER'S OPINION. In the Southern States of this Union slavery exists by the laws of the States and under the guaranty of the Constitution of the United States...

The case of Mr. and Mrs. Lemmon was a case of necessity, as alleged by them; and, as if to meet their case, Mr. Webster adds:

Your Lordship observes that I have spoken only of American vessels driven into British ports by the disasters of the seas, or carried in by unlawful force, the purpose of law trade, to bring with her, and keep over her, the common cases.

Mr. W. confines himself to cases of vessels driven into British ports by the disasters of the seas, or carried in by unlawful force, because they are the common cases, implying that there were other cases where the necessity might not be so great--perhaps the mere necessity of convenience.

Your Lordship will please to bear in mind, that the proposition which I am endeavoring to support is, that by the comity of the law of nations, and the practice of modern times, merchant vessels entering open ports of other nations, for the purpose of trade, are presumed to be allowed to bring with them, and to retain on their protection and government, the jurisdiction and laws of their country.

If such be the law of nations, governing the relations between governments wholly separate and distinct, much more, it is declared, are they called for by the comity which should characterize these United States? In conclusion, Mr. Webster says:

If, therefore, vessels of the United States, pursuing lawful voyages, from port to port, along their own shores, are driven by stress of weather, or carried by unlawful force into English ports, the government of the United States cannot consent that the local authorities in those ports shall take advantage of such misfortunes, and enter them, for the purpose of interfering with the condition of persons or things on board as established by their own laws.
