ARRIVAL OF THE STEAMER EUROPA

Three Days Later From Europe. New York, Dec. 23.—The steamer Europa has arrived, bringing Liverpool dates of the 20th, 21st, and 22nd inst.

ENGLAND.—The Chancellor of the Exchequer has given notice in Parliament of an amendment to the Finance Bill.

THE VIKER OF WELLINGTON was buried with great pomp on the 18th.

The West India mail steamer La Plata had arrived at Southampton. The captain and eight of the crew had died of fever during the passage.

The Earl of Strathmore, the eminent English Catholic, had died at Rome.

A treaty of alliance between Great Britain and the Sandwich Islands, dated May 10th, had been published.

The steamer Victoria, for St. Petersburg, had been lost near Gothenburg, and eight of the crew had perished.

The Emperor of Mexico announces that the Presidential will be reduced 30,000 men after January 1st.

The Sultan of Turkey has refused to receive the Russian minister as a guest.

The President's new Bank, "Des Harpours," will certainly be established, notwithstanding the opposition of the Rothschilds and other capitalists.

The works of Napoleon I. are to be published in 35 volumes 1st.

A meeting of American citizens, held at the American Club Room in Paris, resolved on a petition for Daniel Webster's extradition, and an address was delivered by Mr. Ross.

BRITAIN.—The Belgian Committee are discussing the effects of the Peace against foreign sovereigns, i. e. Louis Napoleon.

ITALY.—The Genoa King had approved the Trans-Atlantic Steam Company.

AUSTRIA.—The Vienna Ministerial Journal has stated that Austria, from necessity, will acknowledge Napoleon as Emperor.

GREECE.—It is said that the protecting powers have signed a protocol regulating the succession in the Greek throne.

TRINIDAD.—The Peace of Egypt has been signed by the Sultan, thus relieving him from his financial embarrassments.

LIVERPOOL, Nov. 20th.—Cotton is dull and quotations have declined 1-16 to 1-8d. The sales of the two days were 9800 bales, of which 2000 were for export.

Speculators took 6000 and exported 300 bales, of which 2200 bales were American. The quotations are—Fair Orleans 51 1/2, Middling 51 1/2, Fair Mobile 51 1/2, Middling 51 1/2, Fair Cotton 51 1/2, Middling 51 1/2.

DESTRUCTIVE FRESHET IN GEORGIA. CHARLESTON, Dec. 2.—The recent freshet did immense damage at Columbus, Ga. The river was swollen thirty feet above its usual height, seriously injuring the Havre Water Lot.

A large section of the eastern wall of the Reservoir, carrying with it the Engine's Palace Mills, and the bridge connecting the Variety Works with the shore. Fortunately no lives were lost. The heavy stone Reservoir is in ruins, involving a loss of \$40,000. The Variety Works, Palace Mills, and all the other factories, except the Coweta, are stopped, thus throwing eight hundred hands out of employment.
