ADDITIONAL BY THE ARABIA.

We find in the papers some additional items of foreign news:

FRANCE. The French Assembly continue to manifest hostility in various ways to the dictation of the Government, and a dissolution is expected. A bet of 40,000 francs is pending on a race from Bordeaux to New York between the American ship President Fillmore and the new Bordeaux clipper Benjamin.

TURKEY. The aspect of Turkish affairs is less favorable. Menschikoff, the Russian Ambassador, is reported to have called on the Porte for a final reply respecting the Holy places within eight days. The Porte had summoned the advice of the English and French Ambassadors, who instantly despatched couriers to their respective governments.

Latest.—The Morning Post, of the 25th, publishes a second edition, declaring positively that the Russian Minister at Paris had received an intimation from Constantinople later than 7 P.M.; that the reply of the Porte was to be given on the 10th, and that there was no ground for a statement that the Porte had already decided to demand of the Russian Ambassador.

GERMANY. It is said that the reigning Duke of Alenburgh intends abdicating in favor of his son, Duke Ernest Schwender, U. S. Consul at Frankfurt on the Main, died on the 6th inst.

RUSSIA. Rigorous measures are about being adopted in Russia to check the spread of Mormonism.

MARKETS. Liverpool, May 21.—A fair business has been done in cotton, the daily sales averaging over 2500 bales. Lower grades now in better currency. Spinnings purchases continue to be held and holders do not refuse sales, so that 1-16th per lb. advance is all that can be quoted. Breadstuffs.—In breadstuffs a fair business has been doing and holders firm. Fine wheat and flour commanded full rates—inferior sorts rather lower. Indian corn was in moderate request, and white 61, dearer.

Washington Affairs. Washington, May 31.—Mr. De Bow, the Superintendent of the Census, has discharged six clerks to day, and purposes to reduce his force to thirty by the first of July.

John Goddard, who has been nearly a dozen years at the head of the City Police, has been dismissed, and James H. Birch appointed in his place. The retiring Commissioner of the Public Buildings was burnt in effigy on Capitol Hill last night by some rowdies. One of them was arrested and fined. B. B. French, Esq., is the new Commissioner of Public Buildings.

Presbyterian General Assembly. Detroit, May 31.—The Presbyterian General Assembly, to day, by an almost unanimous vote, adopted an amendment to their report, declaring marriage with a sister's child to be contrary to the laws of God, and revolting to humanity.

A protest was entered by the Southern States against the resolutions of a new committee of conference with the Home Missionary Society was appointed. Gen. Garland was to leave Washington yesterday en route for New Mexico. Much speculation is indulged in by Washington correspondents relative to the troubles in that quarter, and many predict that war is at hand. "Ion," of the Baltimore Sun, says: But it will be two months before any American blood will be spilt on American soil, so as to indicate the war without any formal declaration on either side. I hope that the Government will be able to give Gen. Garland such a force as will enable him to come Palo Alto over his opponents in Mesilla valley.

John Dooley died in Williamsburg, N. Y., on Friday, from injuries sustained by the explosion of a camphene lamp.

It is stated that a man named Backus perished in the flames during the late fire at Kalamazoo, Mich., when the Railroad Hotel was destroyed.

The brig Advance, with Dr. Kane and his party, on their expedition to the Arctic seas, sailed from New York on Tuesday. A large number of persons accompanied the vessel down the Bay.

STOLEN DIAMONDS RECOVERED.—The police of the city of New York have succeeded in recovering five thousand dollars worth of diamonds, which were stolen on the 26th ult. from the store room of Mr. J. Jacobs, of Boston, on board the steamer Empire State.

The parcel containing the diamonds was found concealed under the middle of the engine room, and the lower saloon, near the engine room, and a colored waiter on board the boat is now in prison, charged with stealing the diamonds.

Boston, May 30.—The brig Waitelle, from Wilmington, came in collision, on Saturday night, with a steamer, supposed to be the "City of New York," for Philadelphia, and received so much damage as to render it necessary to throw over 150 barrels of naval stores.
