THE STEAMER SAN FRANCISCO. The following dispatch was received by the Secretary of the Navy on Sunday from Messrs. Aspinwall & Co., owners...

NEW YORK, January 28.—Mate of the brig Napoleon spoke the steamer San Francisco, Dec. 23. He gives a consistent and intelligent report, and states that Capt. Watkins had plenty of provisions. He had, however, lightened the ship. There were no men at the pumps.

The brig Napoleon was reported to be in thirty days of her berth, and saw twenty male persons on board. The cabin, hurricane deck, forward and aft were standing. The damages to the steamer were merely in her upper works, masts, rigging, and rigging.

SEARCH FOR THE SAN FRANCISCO. BALTIMORE, Jan. 9.—The steamer Union of the Baltimore and Charleston line, has been chartered by the Secretary of the Navy to proceed in search of the steamer San Francisco. She will leave tomorrow.

EDWIN BURNT IN EFFIGY. WHEELING, Jan. 9.—The arrival of Bedini in this city created great excitement, and he was burnt in effigy. After which he thought it prudent to leave the city.

ELECTION OF MAYOR. BOSTON, Jan. 9.—Dr. J. V. C. Smith, the people's candidate, has been elected Mayor of this city, after several unsuccessful trials.

GREAT FIRE IN PHILADELPHIA, &c. PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 9.—The machine shop of the Reading Railroad, together with eight or nine engines, were burnt to shreds. Loss estimated at \$100,000.

ARRIVAL OF THE GEORGE LAW AND STAR OF THE WEST. NEW YORK, Jan. 9.—The steamers George Law and Star of the West have arrived, bringing \$1,724,900 in gold.

RAILROAD ACCIDENT. BOSTON, Jan. 7.—Yesterday afternoon, Mr. Benjamin Mudge, while walking on the track of the Eastern Railroad, near Ipswich, was run over by the passenger train, and sustained serious injuries. It will be necessary to amputate both legs. Mr. Mudge is commissioner of Essex county.

DECISION IN THE ANTI-RENT CASE. NEW YORK, Jan. 5.—The court of Appeals of this State, after a long session, has decided against the claims of the Anti-Renters.

IMPORTANT FROM CALIFORNIA.—ARRIVAL OF THE ELBORADO. By the steamer Eldorado the San Francisco papers of the 16th have been received. The principal items of interest relate to the capture of the Governor, and the capture of the steamer El Dorado.

THE PACIFIC RAILROAD SURVEYING EXPEDITION WAS IN THE SOUTH, and an elaborate report was expected to be published in a few days.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE AT PORTLAND. PORTLAND, Jan. 8.—The Custom House at this place was entirely destroyed by fire this morning. The fire broke out in the Custom House, and spread to the adjacent buildings.

THREATENED RIOT AT WHEELING. WHEELING, Jan. 7.—Riots had been posted through the city to-day threatening Bedini, the Pope's Nuncio, who is at present here. No disturbance has however yet taken place.

NOMINATION. COLUMBUS, Jan. 7.—The Democratic State Convention of Ohio today adopted the Baltimore platform of 1852, and nominated S. F. Norris for judge of the Supreme court of the State.

PROBABLE LOSS OF THE JAS. A. SHANTER. NEW YORK, Jan. 8.—There are fears entertained here of the loss of the Calcutta ship James A. Shanter. Her cargo is valued at \$300,000.
