THE BALTIC FLEET.

The departure of the first division of this fleet, and the review by the Queen, as described by the English papers, must have presented one of the most imposing and magnificent spectacles of the kind ever witnessed.

We cannot but admire the quiet energy of the British Government. With how few words, how little parade, has this great British fleet been prepared.

SPIRIT OF THE PRESS.

Saturday's Enquirer has an article upon railroad and steamboat accidents. The chapter of accidents for the year 1853, says the Enquirer, is appalling.

The editorial columns of the Post are filled with extracts from late foreign intelligence, and comments thereon.

The Mail alludes to a committee's report in the House of Representatives adverse to the House bill making a grant of public lands to the several States and Territories for the benefit of the indigent insane, which takes the ground that Congress has no authority to dispose of the public lands for railroad and other purposes.

The Whig—referring to the fact that some papers are opposing an extra session of the Legislature for the reason, among others, that it is unconstitutional—says it is clearly within the provisions of the constitution to have an extra session in two ways: first by application to the Governor from a majority of the members of both houses, and next when in his opinion the interests of the commonwealth may require it.

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EXPENSES OF THE MINT.—James Ross Snowden, Director of the United States mint, sends to the Secretary of the Treasury an interesting statement of the expenses of the mint for the past six years. For the first five years mentioned in the statement—namely, to 31st December, 1852—the actual expenses over and above the charges amounted to \$305,812 90—being an average expense to the U. S. States, during that period, of \$61,162 58 annually.

HOBBLE.—Two jail-birds named James Fanning and James Sullivan, who were locked up together in a cell in New Orleans, got into a fight a few days since, when, says the Crescent, Sullivan bit Fanning severely on the breast, but one of his ears, and chewed one of his fingers in the most horrible manner; he also nearly succeeded in the ingenious experiment of gouging out an eye for his opponent, giving that tender organ the appearance of having been submitted to an operation of strabismus which had terminated unfortunately.

A negro woman, employed in the boarding house of Mrs. Fletcher, in Washington, was accidentally burnt to death last Monday night.

VIRGINIA.

FUNERAL OF MR. TUNSTALL.—The funeral sermon of the late Whitcomb P. Tunstall was preached in the Masonic Temple, at Danville, last Tuesday morning, by the Rev. Samuel S. Bryant, of the Methodist Episcopal Church. The Register pays a high compliment to the discourse. Many a brilliant eye unwept to weep, and many an aged eye which has seen much of human suffering, and often watched with anxious solicitude around the death-bed of expiring humanity, with calm and steady light found their slight suffused with tears of emotion before the power of their feelings to restrain.

DEATH OF BANISTER ANDERSON.—The Danville papers announce the death of Mr. Banister Anderson. He died at his residence, Laurel Grove, Pittsylvania county, on Tuesday morning last, after a long illness. He was distinguished by many generous and affectionate traits of character; by a charitable and Christian spirit, and by a liberality engendered by an ardent desire to bring to development the resources of his native State. He was a firm friend of the Richmond and Danville Railroad; and (says the Register), so thoroughly imbued was the mind of the lamented Tunstall, with the estimable services of Mr. Anderson, in behalf of this important work, that his dying wish was that the deceased might live to see its completion.

OCEAN STEAMERS.—The Norfolk Argus learns from a credible source, that the steamers now running between Philadelphia and Liverpool, are also to run to Norfolk and Baltimore, and that the first trip will be made next June. The experiment will be made, and it sufficient inducement is offered it will be regularly prosecuted.

CEREBRAL.—Rev. Mr. Mason, pastor of the Baptist church in Petersburg, contemplated recently a change of location; but has been induced to remain for Mayor.—John R. Cooke has been nominated for Mayor of Portsmouth, by a 'No-party mass meeting.'

THE OLD SOLDIERS.—The Convention of Soldiers of the War of 1812, assembled in Norfolk last Thursday. Besides those from the city, there were delegates present from Norfolk county and Portsmouth, Nansemond, Princess Anne, Southampton and Elizabeth City. The Herald says: The Convention numbered at its organization just seventy-six persons, a remarkable coincidence—and it was truly gratifying to note the re-unions of these old soldiers after a forty years' separation, at the close of a war which their patriotism and valor had contributed to render glorious to the country.

MOBILE RACES.—The Mobile Register of the 29th ult, gives the following description of the close of the Spring term: Yesterday was the last day, and the first race for a purse of \$100,000, in the horse-chase, was the favorite against the field before starting, and stood at odds after the first heat.

THE ALVAREZ MOVEMENT.—We copy the following from the Panama Star of the 16th March: It will be seen that this account differs materially from that recently given by the Mexican papers. We are informed that when the John L. Stephens left Acapulco, Gen. Alvarez, governor of the province, who recently 'declared' against the Administration of Santa Anna, had six thousand troops well armed and organized under his control. Santa Anna had sent from Mexico a large force to subdue Alvarez, three thousand five hundred of whom had already arrived in the province of Acapulco, and it was daily expected that a collision would take place between the opposing forces, the Acapulco people feeling quite confident that Santa Anna's troops would be easily routed.

FREE SCHOOLS.—The people of Halifax will vote, on the 4th Thursday in May, upon the propriety of establishing a system of free schools in that county.

SUICIDE.—A highly respectable lady, (says the Danville Republican of Friday,) the wife of Mr. Smith Bouldin, of Halifax, committed suicide on last Monday morning by cutting her throat. The deceased was about forty-five years of age, and had been subject to attacks of despondency.

RESIGNATION.—The Charlottesville Jeffersonian states that the present special mail agent for Virginia and North Carolina, Mr. English, intends resigning his office, and Mr. J. W. Finks, one of the editors of the Alexandria Sentinel, is to be appointed in his place.

HISTORICAL.—The Historical Association of Danville will give their first exhibition next Tuesday evening.

DEDICATION.—The new 'Masonic Temple,' in Danville, will be dedicated on the 24th of May, with much ceremony.

DROWNED.—We learn from the Weston Herald, that Mr. Pinckney H. Ellison, was drowned last week, while endeavoring to cross Elk River, a short distance above Col. Wm. Jackson's mill-dam, at Sutton, in the county of Braxton.

MURDER CASE.—The Grand Jury of Lewis county have made an indictment against Silas Bailey, for the murder of his wife, but the case will not be tried during the present term of the Circuit Court, owing to the absence of material witnesses. The murder was committed last fall.

POST OFFICE MATTERS.—Postmaster Campbell has established the following post offices in Virginia: Pierceton, Marion county, Moses Wallace, postmaster. Hesseville, Harrison county, Squire W. C. Davis, postmaster. Sonntag, Franklin county, Wm. H. Dent, postmaster. Snowgap, Pulaski county, Stillman B. Snow, postmaster.

INSUREUR JAIL.—Samuel T. Izenhart, charged with the robbery of Mr. Alex Armstrong, has been removed from the jail in Glimer county to the jail in Lewis—the one in the former place being thought insecure.

WHEAT.—The prospect for a good wheat crop in Lewis county, has much improved within the past month. We learn from the Herald that many fields present a luxuriant appearance. The early sowing is doing the best, some farmers having determined to sow oats on fields which had been sown late.

TOBACCO.—The Petersburg Intelligencer says there have been inspected in that city from the 31st September to the 31st March, 3095 hogsheads of tobacco. For the same period last year the inspection was 3838 hogsheads—showing a loss for the half year just expired of 743 hogsheads. This is owing undoubtedly to the shortness of the crop of 1853.

SUDDEN DEATH.—Mr. Edward Jones, an old and highly respected citizen of Bedford county, was found dead in his bed on the morning of the 23d ult.

A female of unusual mind, Cassandra M. Davis, residing with Mr. John H. Wiley, Loudoun county, left her home on Tuesday evening, the 21st of March, and has not since been heard of. She is an elderly woman, spare form, and dressed in dark clothes.

THE MILWAUKEE SLAVE RIOT.—Mr. Booth, the Milwaukee editor, who has been examined before the United States Commissioner for his participation in the late fugitive slave case, is expected to be received from his present confinement in the U. S. District Court, to be held at Madison on Friday next.
