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ARRIVAL OF THE PROMETHEUS.

New York, Sept. 25.—The steamer Prometheus arrived at 12 o'clock, bringing \$1,000,000 in gold...

The principal contractors of the gold by the Prometheus were Deane & Sherman, \$417,000; Adams & Co., \$293,000; Wells & Fargo, \$110,000; Drexel & Co., \$63,000; and the Metropolitan Bank \$69,000.

Winchester, August 4, 1794. Mr. Elliott's balloon ascension, from Magnolia Springs, on the Seaboard and Roanoke Railroad, last Saturday, was witnessed by some 1500 people.

The balloon rose to an altitude of about two miles, and descended not more than half a mile distant from the place of starting.

ARRIVAL OF A BALTIMORE WRECKED CREW. New York, Sept. 25.—The Portuguese schooner Jupiter brings Captain Mond and crew of the brig Foulney, of Baltimore, from Liverpool for Baltimore, abandoned on the 10th inst.

THE YELLOW FEVER AT THE SOUTH. COLUMBIA, S. C., Sept. 25.—Five deaths occurred at Augusta on Saturday from yellow fever, notwithstanding the reduced population of the city.

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 24.—The number of deaths in the Charity Hospital of yellow fever, during the week, was 150.

AFFAIRS IN NEW ORLEANS.—The New Orleans papers of September 20, report that the city has become quiet. She pleasured Tuesday evening says:

We trust that the riots which late prevailed to such an alarming extent have now forever ended. Last night the regular police, aided by a small citizen patrol, were on duty, and not the slightest disturbance manifested itself in any portion of the city.

Thomas McShane, who was stabbed in the abdomen on Sunday night, died on Tuesday at the Charity Hospital. It had not been definitely ascertained by whom the fatal wound was inflicted.

Rev. C. H. Williamson, the French Missionary in New Orleans, who has had a severe attack of yellow fever, has recovered.

CHANGE.—It is stated that Purser Sinclair, the present Chief of the Bureau of Provisions and Clothing, is to be relieved on the 1st of October, by Purser Horatio Bridge.

BOSTON.—The total number of deaths in Boston during the past week was 82—five less than the previous week. Four were by cholera and eleven by dysentery.

EXECUTION.—Two slaves, Mose and Tom, were executed in Abbeville, S. C., for the murder of Jesse Mattox.

RAILROAD ACCIDENT.—The recent accident on the Georgia Railroad was more serious than first reported. It appears that on Thursday night last the passenger train and a down freight train came in collision, by which the engineer on the train, Robert Spencer, and a fireman named Chas. Davis, were instantly killed; and that Henry Dorsey, engineer, and Thomas Gibson, fireman on the down train, were seriously injured.

SAVANNAH.—The 19 deaths in Savannah on Friday last, including 15 of yellow fever. The editor of the Republican, we are happy to observe, is again at his post.

THE telegraph office in Savannah continues open, according to the N. O. Pictorial, had been prescribed for him, by his physicians, who, however, as the patient had cholera in its worst stage, had little or no expectation of any thing but a fatal termination of the case.
